Russian Forced To Work Hard For Necessities

WASHINGTON — A Russian industrial worker must put in 16 hours to make enough to buy a pound of tea.

He must work two hours and 12 minutes to buy a pound of beef, 4½ hours to buy a pound of butter and an hour and 50 minutes for a pound of sugar.

These figures were released Tuesday by the Bureau of Labor Statistics.

The bureau has collected data on countries in Western Europe, Russia and the United States.

Its conclusions:

1. The American worker has it the best of all.
2. The Russian worker has it the worst of all.

The Labor Bureau says it thinks, with the same amount of work, an industrial worker in this country can buy more than five times as many groceries as a Russian worker can buy in a Moscow state store.

A word of warning: Miss Faith Williams, who headed the group that rounded up the statistics, says some guesswork had to be done in many cases.

Bracing Punctured Furthermore, all figures had to be the official figures of the governments, and figures can be used to hide facts as well as reveal them.

"But I think in general they show conditions pretty well," Miss Williams told a reporter. "Certainly they show that the Russians still are low by our standards, for all their bragging to countries in the Far East."

Figured in minutes, here is the time needed in each country to make enough to buy one pound of each product:

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Building Agenda For Education Needs Drawn

PORTLAND — A new journal-ism building at the University of Oregon has top priority in an \$8,180,000 education building program to be submitted to the State Legislature.

The program, which also includes buildings for five other Oregon college campuses, was approved Monday by the building committee of the State Board of Higher Education. Also approved were plans for a six million dollar teaching hospital at Portland.

After the journalism unit, in the program for the Legislature, a chemical engineering building at Oregon State College was given priority. Third was a physical education plant at Southern Oregon College of Education. Then came a 1,200,000 wing for biological and agricultural science at Oregon State A1 million dollar school of dentistry building in Portland was eighth on the priority list.

The board's finance committee approved an annual operating budget of \$13,247,240. It included: Oregon State College, \$4,714,799; University of Oregon, \$3,346,808; Dental School, \$659,118; Medical School, \$1,171,937; Oregon College of Education, \$483,245; Southern Oregon College of Education, \$397,336; Eastern Oregon College of Education, \$346,642; Portland State Extension Center, \$305,393; General Extension Division, \$601,185.

The committee also approved a \$4,759,730 budget for public services. It includes: University of Oregon Medical School Teaching Hospital, clinics and extension services, \$852,414; federal cooperative extension service in agriculture, including home economics and 4-H clubs, \$1,855,611; agricultural re-

search and experiment stations, \$2,051,705.

The committee approved a program for co-operation between the board and the State Department of Education in dealing with handicapped children. The department would furnish \$5,100 annually and the board \$10,200 the first year and \$6,600 annually after that.

Funds for the big teaching hospital already are on hand.
