Hood area streams, though, are too cold.

In Southwestern Oregon coastal streams and lakes the fish should be biting well, the report says although spring Chinook fishing on the Lower Umpqua has been poor.

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Sports Northern Division Marks May Fall

The record books may be in for a beating at the two Northern Division track meets scheduled for this weekend.

The two-mile meet record and the broad-jump standard may be bettered when favored Oregon faces Idaho at Moscow Saturday. Two-mile and javelin marks could fall in the Washington-Oregon State meeting at Seattle.

Wayne Reiser and Fred Turner of Oregon, both slated to run at Moscow, already have run the two-mile under the meet mark of 9:50.7.

Don McClure, also of Oregon, is expected to top the broad-jump standard of 22 feet 11 and the Webfoot relay team stands a good chance of bettering the record of 3:28.6.

Denny Meyer of Washington and Ralph Sutton of Oregon State could be the standard-setters at Seattle. Meyer ran the two-mile against Oregon in 9:26.8 two weeks ago. The meet mark is 9:27.5.

Sutton tossed the javelin 201 feet 8 inches in the Idaho meet last week. The Seattle meet record is almost six feet under Sutton's mark.

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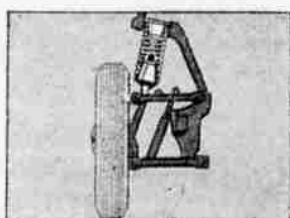
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
