

Indian Thinclads Walloped By Grants Pass Cinder Team

The best Grants Pass track team in years gave the Roseburg thinclads their worst beating of the year Thursday night on Finlay Field.

Scoring 10 first places, the Cave-men walked to an 82-30 victory over the outclassed Indians. Bob Paylor led the way to the top by winning both the 100-yard dash and the 200-yard dash. He also won the 400-yard dash. Ed Stritzke, who made his bid going into the third lap and gradually pulled away to win by 20 yards.

Grants Pass made one of its best showings to close out a brilliant night in the relay event. Larry Schweinfurt, Dave Talbot, Don Korns and Dick Williams posted the best time this year at 1:37.6. Another outstanding show was put on by Gary McFarland in the pole vault. He left all opposition as he soared to 11 feet 7 inches. He tried to break the field record when the bar was hoisted to 12-1, but couldn't make it.

Three of Thursday night's four went overtime. A Jim Russell homer gave Portland a 6-5 edge over Los Angeles in the 17th, and Elmer Singleton pitched a no-hitter for San Francisco through 12 only to lose to Sacramento 1-0 in the 13th.

Oakland needed 10 for a 3-2 victory at Seattle. And in the only game that finished in the regulation nine, Hollywood beat San Diego 9-0. But after all, those two went 18 frames the previous night.

As both San Diego and Los Angeles lost, the Padres maintained their one and one-half game league lead over the Angels. But Hollywood moved up just two and one-half games out of the top spot.

At Portland, Los Angeles Manager Stan Hack has nominated Cal Melish, winner in his only outing since being sent westward by the Chicago Cubs, to try to turn back the Heavers Friday night.

Russell's 375-foot smash Thursday night came off Left Hander Fred Baczewski, the fifth Los Angeles hurler. Fred had held the Beavers scoreless from the 11th. Roy Helser, who went the last three innings for Portland, got the victory.

A stolen base won for Oakland over Seattle. In the 19th Pete Milne pilfered second after he had singled. That put him in scoring position and he tallied when Sam Chapman knocked a one-baser. Tookie Gilbert and Lloyd Christopher homered for the winners' other two runs.

Boston Red Sox Crowd Browns After Twin Win

Those beautiful Browns are not the only "amazing" team in the American League. How about those upstart Boston Red Sox?

Lou Boudreau's pink-cheeked bobby Sox have been knocking the stuff out of the opposition right from the start, but they have been overshadowed by the tremendous surge of the once-lively St. Louis Browns.

It took a Browns postponement to cast the spotlight on the comeback of once-powerful Boston. The youth-infested Red Sox hurled a "move over" challenge at the Browns Thursday by whipping the World Champion New York Yankees, 3-2, to sweep their two-game series.

It took the Red Sox 11 innings to do it but in the end they had their third consecutive victory stored away to boost their season record to nine triumphs and only two losses. That actually put them a half game in front of the Browns. St. Louis, however, remained in first place percentage-wise. The Browns showed a 7-1 .875 mark to Boston's 9-2 .818.

In the day's only other activity, the Boston Braves overcame a 3-0 deficit with three tallies in the eighth and three more in the 10th to defeat the New York Giants.

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Yoncalla Wins 'B' Meet; Eight Records Shattered

Defending champion Yoncalla held its throne for another year by topping a field of seven Douglas County "B" teams in the record-breaking county meet Thursday night on Finlay Field.

A total of eight records went by the boards as Yoncalla combined five first-places with enough depth to walk away with the meet with 45 2-3 points. Drain was only an average second with 35 1-3. Canyonville won the third-place trophy with 27 points. Days Creek had 21, Glide 14, Riddle 5 and Glendale 2 1/2.

In spite of being combined with the Grants Pass-Roseburg dual meet, it was a brilliant affair in itself. Records were shattered in both the dashes, the 440 and mile, both hurdles, the javelin and the relay.

Probably the most decisive record breakers were Bill Hoffee and Charles Falconer of Canyonville and Jerry Boan of Yoncalla. Hoffee ran off with the high-point honors by coping the 100 and 220 and running on the record-shattering relay team. His 11 1/4 points helped make his Pirates the surprise team of the meet. He lopped almost half a second off the 100-yard dash and easily defeated Freshman Gary Coats of Glide in what was heralded as the race of races. He knocked off almost a second in the 220 to set his second mark of the evening.

Displays Speed
His blazing speed was matched by the dogged and clever distance runner of a freshman teammate named Charles Falconer. The 7-1 1/2 youngster chopped 7 1/2 seconds off the mile record.

Jerry Boan was the third of the flashing record breakers. He scampered to victories in both hurdles to add 10 points to the Yoncalla score. He shaved only four-tenths of a second off the high mark, but lopped off a full two seconds from the low-hurdle record.
