National Music Week To Be From May 4-11

The twenty-ninth annual observance of National Music Week will begin Sunday, May 4, and will continue through Mother's Day, Sunday May 11. The keynote of this year's observance is "MAKE YOUR LIFE MORE MUSICAL." The secondary, or alternate keynote is Foster American Music. The challenge of these aims is that one must become a part of music to truly enjoy it.

Under this theme the most widely organized effort in the history of Music Week will be made. Commended by the President of the United States, proclaimed by governors and mayors throughout the land, publicized by the press and radio, America in cities large and small will pay tribute to music as one of the great cultural forces of life. The quality of choral and instrumental music, whether in urban or rural areas, amateur or professional, has advanced to the point where there can be no doubt of the position American holds in the world of music or in the devotion of its people to music.

As Honorary Chairman of the National Committee for Music Week, President Harry Truman has said: "The advancement of musical education, music making and appreciative listening are important factors in our country's musical and cultural progress."

"The power of music to bring people together in common understanding and fellowship is a strong, dynamic force. Music is vital to a well-rounded life. Its contribution to the welfare of our armed forces and to the efficiency of workers in the defense effort are tangible proof of its power and value."

"I earnestly hope that the cooperative activities of the people

of Oregon will make Music Week an even greater success than in the past."

The activities of Music Week in Roseburg are under the direction of a committee from the Douglas County Music Teachers' Association. This group includes Mrs. Sherman Plimpton, chairman; Miss Naomi Scott, Mrs. Myrtle Burr, Mrs. Homer Grow and Mrs. Willis Erickson. Music events of interest to the entire community will be presented throughout the week. These will include the Spring Concert of the Choral Society, concerts by the singing organizations of the schools, and other active musical groups. The choir of the First Christian Church will present an oratorio, assisted by the string section of the Roseburg Symphony. Special programs of local talent will be presented by radio stations KRNR and KRXL. Detailed announcements of these events will be given by radio and press. No admission will be charged during the entire week.

It is the hope of the committee and music lovers of the community that there will be wide participation in all these activities which will lead to the extension of musical resources benefiting old and young on a year-round basis.
