Fluoridation Program Voted At Hillsboro
HILLSBORO (AP)—City Manager J. W. Barney said it will be some time before fluorine will be added to Hillsboro's water supply. Voters approved the fluoridation program, 182-165, here Friday night. Also approved was a \$150,000 bond issue for a new sewer system. The vote for the bond issue was 284-81.

The President said Clark will continue in the Far East "the policies which have been so ably carried out by Gen. Ridgway with regard to the United Nations action in Korea, including, if possible, the achievement of an honorable armistice."

3 Die When U.S. Plane Falls In British Town

KENT, Eng. (AP)—A burning U.S. Thunderjet fighter crashed into the Main Street bank building of this little Southeast England town Saturday, killing the American pilot and an elderly British couple.

The explosion collapsed the bank structure in flames which flashed into an adjoining home, critically burning a housewife as she cooked her Sunday dinner.

The pilot, whose body was hurled into a yard adjoining the destroyed building, was identified only as Capt. Clifford Frogarty, 29. The dead couple, found in the ruins, were in their apartment above the bank offices.

Rainmaking Control Heeded For Legislature

PORTLAND (AP)—Control of rainmaking in Oregon would be put in the hands of a governor-appointed five-man board under a proposed bill drafted here Saturday by a legislative interim committee.

The state engineer and state director of agriculture would be board members under the proposal.

Cloud seeders, besides being required to buy a permit, would have to post liability bond. Chairman Ben Day, state senator from Gold Hill, suggested that the minimum bond be set at \$10,000 and the maximum at \$200,000. Fees from the permits would be used to finance further study of weather control.

Fatal Beating Leads To Murder Conviction

OREGON CITY (AP)—Elmer Dorsey Williams, convicted Sunday of second degree murder in the fatal beating of Jalmar Tarkia last January, will be sentenced Wednesday

by Circuit Judge Ralph M. Holman. Williams was accused of beating the 68-year-old Portland man in the Milwaukie home of Mrs. Bonnie Kuhnhausen Jan. 16.
Mrs. Kuhnhausen will face trial on a first degree murder charge in July in connection with the same slaying.

Visitors were James Morgan, commander, and Loyal Burns, junior past commander, of the Drain VFW post.

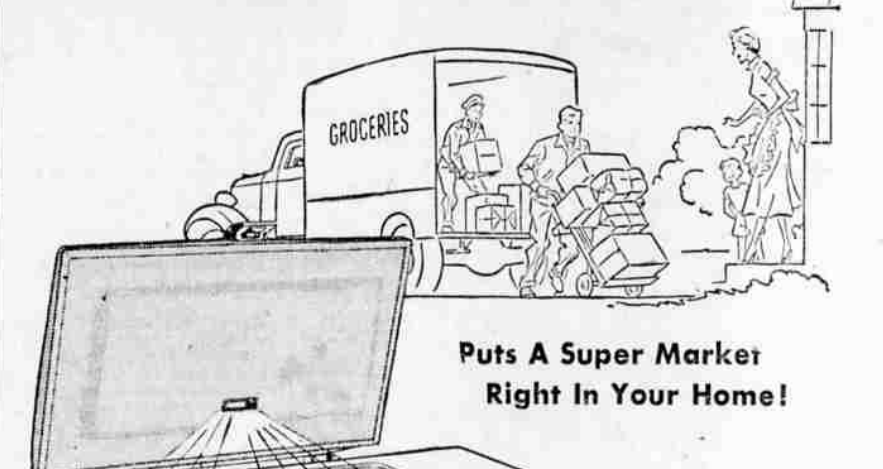
