Rev. Mr. Hodges Speaks to Folk At Lookingglass

A capacity house heard Rev. Lynn Hodges of Topeka, Kan., when he spoke Sunday night at the local church. Lynn was graduated from the Lookingglass High School in 1938, after having lived in the valley with his family for a number of years. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ted Hodges, now reside in Roseburg. The Rev. Mr. Hodges expressed deep appreciation of the opportunity to greet so many of his boyhood friends and to renew acquaintances. He spoke in some detail of the circumstances leading to the launching of his radio program, "The Way of Life," heard daily at 6:45 a.m. over station KRNR in Roseburg, and over seven stations in all, including a short wave broadcast to Equador, Peru.

After leaving Lookingglass, Lynn was graduated from the Bible Standard Institute in Eugene and later received his A.B. degree from the Ottawa University Baptist School of Theology, Ottawa, Kans. Later, working for his masters degree, Lynn spent one year at the

Washburn University of Topeka. He has served four years as pastor of the First Baptist Church, which he has been influential in organizing and for which a new building is being planned.
