Rescue From Tiger Wins Carnegie Medal

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Sixteen persons have been awarded Carnegie hero medals, one of them a young Illinois farmer who rescued a 58-year-old man from a mauling by a wild tiger that escaped from a zoo.

The Illinois farmer, Harold F. Keith of near Mason City, fought off a 400-pound tiger which broke out of a pen at a Mason City private zoo.

The infuriated animal had knocked a man down and had one of his legs in its jaws when Keith grabbed a four-foot long automobile drive shaft and struck the tiger repeatedly in the head, stunning it with the help of another bystander who came to Keith's assistance.

Social Security Aids Employees In Households

Are you one of the seven hundred thousand regular household employees now building towards old-age and survivors insurance protection? If you are it is important for you to have a social security account card and value and guard it as you would an insurance policy, according to Claude E. Dawson, manager of the Eugene social security office.

The amount of the monthly benefits paid to you and your family in your old age or to your dependents in case of your death will be figured from the amount of the wages your household employer reports to your name and the number shown on your social security card. You should have only one social security number during your lifetime. If you should lose your account card, go or write to the Eugene social security office and ask for a duplicate. It will have your old number on it.

Dawson points out that regular household workers are building towards the increased monthly benefit payments provided for in the new social security law. The smallest monthly benefit payment will be \$20 a month. "It would take \$4,000 in savings to buy this amount of protection in private insurance," he says. He estimates that the average household worker is earning about \$80 a month in cash wages. Her retirement benefit payments under social security will be \$40 a month. If her monthly wages are higher, her benefit payments when she stops work at age 65 or later will be higher too. If her wages amount to as much as \$3600 a year, her monthly benefit payment will be \$80.

Dawson suggests that everyone who works regularly in a private household write to the Eugene social security office and ask for a copy of the booklet, "Do You Work In A Private Household?" It clearly explains your new social security.
