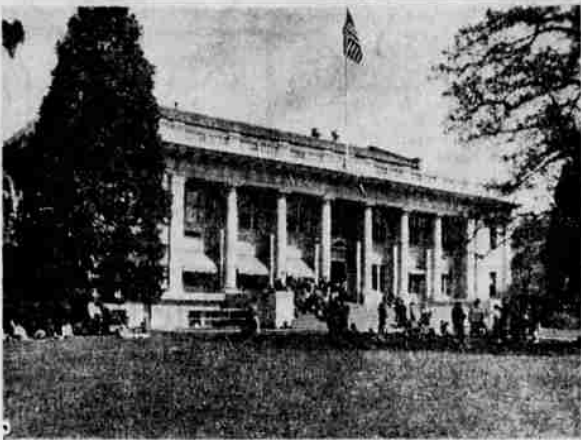


STRIKE HALTS N. W. LOGGING

That is to say: In the current re-shuffle, we get BRAND NEW FACES in all the big military jobs abroad.

How's this—as a tip for us voters: Let's follow the same principle and put BRAND NEW FACES in all the federal civilian jobs at home.

Political oddity: The federal government is reaching avidly for control of EVERYTHING BUT DAYLIGHT-SAVING TIME. If it is to work, with even reasonable satisfaction for ALL of us, "daylight-saving" time must be NATIONAL in its scope. If we are to monkey with the clocks at all, we should monkey with ALL the clocks.

But the federal government clearly wants no part of daylight "saving" time.

That's modern politics for you. Speaking of time, Lee Wheeler tells me that without counting leap years or allowing for interest it would take us 494 years, 122 days, one hour and 20 minutes to pay off our national debt of 260 billion dollars at the rate of \$1,000 every minute.

Now, if somebody will give us the odd seconds, we'll have the subject squeezed fairly dry.

A thousand dollars every minute sounds like a lot of money. It is a lot of money. It's nearly a million and a half dollars every day.

Daylight Saving Given Partial Roseburg Nod

Earlier Hour Suits Trades Association

Schools, Official Units Stay On Standard Time; Radio Stations In Jam

PORTLAND — The Portland City Council Tuesday proclaimed daylight saving time for Portland, to go into effect at 2 a.m. Wednesday.

Representative Roseburg groups, at a meeting Monday afternoon sponsored by the Retail Trades Association, voted overwhelmingly to start business and other functions within the city an hour earlier.

Clocks, however, will not be set ahead.

The earlier hour, however, will in no sense be uniform. While it will be observed largely by local businesses and most industries, most public institutions will not make any change.

Supt. of Schools Paul S. Elliott said the school board granted him authority to make a change only if the city council declares daylight saving time for Roseburg, or if the governor makes the change for the state.

Otherwise schools will continue to operate on standard time. The board felt that no change was justified until some official action was taken.

While the Veterans administration will make the change to an hour earlier operation, the county courthouse, city hall, post office and local banks will not change their hours.

Change Is Optional

The earlier hour of rising and opening of business houses will be strictly optional with the individual concerns. But, based upon the consensus expressed at the meeting Monday, attended by around 80 persons, local retail outlets will observe the change.

J. Worthington, Kin Pass Away Nine Hours Apart

Death of John D. Worthington, 77, resident of 825 Miller St., early today, came less than nine hours after word was received here of the death of Mrs. Worthington's sister, Irene Ellenburg, at Riverside, Calif.

Mr. Worthington passed away after a very short illness at 3 a.m. He was born Jan. 30, 1875, in Nashville, Tenn., and came to Roseburg 12 years ago to make his home. He was a retired building contractor.

Surviving are the widow, Bertha, Roseburg, and several nieces and nephews residing in the South.

Funeral services will be held in the Chapel of The Roses, Roseburg, Thursday, May 1, at 11 a.m., with the Rev. R. C. Kleinfeldt of the First Christian Church officiating. Interment will be in the Masonic Cemetery.

Miss Ellenburg was a native of Douglas County. She was born on Drain Aug. 1, 1887, the daughter of William and Julia Ellenburg, early pioneers. She was a registered nurse. She passed away at 6 p.m. Monday.

Surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Bertha Worthington, Roseburg, and Mrs. Vernita Morse, Los Angeles, and a brother, Geary Ellenburg, Lebanon.

Funeral services will be held at Riverside, Calif. Mrs. Worthington following the services for her husband Thursday.

Salem Firm Ordered To Reinstate Strikers

WASHINGTON — The W. W. Rosebraugh Co. of Salem, Ore., Saturday was ordered by the National Labor Relations Board to reinstate strikers to workers who struck July 17 last year.

The company also was directed to pay the workers wages equal to the amount they would have earned since then.

FAST TIME CHAOS

Pupils Tardy Because Buses Won't Switch

SULLIVAN, Ind. — A squabble over daylight saving time has put the 420 pupils in Sullivan's schools on a perpetually tardy basis.

The school buses have continued their rounds on standard time, though the city and school classes switched to a daylight time schedule Monday.

Jesse Smith, Hamilton township trustee, who directs the bus operation, said he's bound by a 1949 state law that requires governmental units to stay on standard time.

Like the City Council, the School Board got around that by moving school hours up an hour, and Superintendent Phil Eskew said that's the way it will stay.

Sullivan is on the edge of a standard time island in Southwest Indiana.

Sinking Fund Begun For New Road Project

Engineering studies are continuing on a Lone Rock-to-Sutherland route and a "large amount" has been set aside for a sinking fund for the construction of the proposed route, the County Court said Monday.

This was told representatives of the Sutherland-Oakland short route committee in a meeting with the court.

John Buchanan, chairman of the committee, said his group is "pleased" by the action of the court and "grateful for the consideration given to the committee's recommendations."

The committee last March 31 had, in a 10-page statement to the court, asked for establishment of the sinking fund and declared that it "recognized the need for further study of the routes."

The court did not make public the amount of the sinking fund being established.

There was no discussion Monday of the relative merits of the two routes on which the two groups had been opposed. The court last December had announced a decision to build the route down the North Umpqua River to Sutherland. The committee had been planning for a route cutting north to Nonpareil.

In its comments to the short route committee, the court declared it had been making engineering surveys at every available opportunity and would continue to do so.

Conference Stated On School Problems

Problems of taxation, school district reorganization and school programs of study will be discussed Thursday evening at a banquet sponsored by the Roseburg Women's Club.

The event will be held at the Woman's Club Building, 201 E. Mosher St., starting with a no-host dinner at 6:30 p.m.

Senator Dean Walker, Independence, will be the main speaker. The discussion will follow.

Participating in the conference will be George W. Neuner Jr., chairman of the meeting and moderator of a panel discussion; Senator Tom Parkinson; Ralph Jones, superintendent of Grants Pass; and Mrs. Edith Green, of the Oregon P. T. C. Serling, Reedsport; Eugene Fisher, Elkton; Mrs. Dee Clark, Riddle, and Kenneth F. Barneburg, Douglas County superintendent of schools.

The Douglas County Sheriff's Posse is sponsoring a "Showdeo" May 25 at 1:30 p.m., at the Fairgrounds, at which time a queen and four princesses will be chosen to reign over the annual rodeo. The rodeo dates are June 21 and 22.

The posse has dispensed with the idea for this year of choosing a queen in a popularity contest, similar to that being used in selection of a Centennial queen, because it would conflict.

The Showdeo will serve a double purpose. Not only will the queen and her court be selected, but funds to be derived will go toward the \$500 prize to be awarded the all-around cowboy of the rodeo this year. The big prize is considered necessary to attract top cowhands of the nation. Adults will be charged 50 cents and children under 12 years will be admitted free, according to Dick DeBernardi, posse secretary.

A big attraction will be offered May 25. The State Association of Mounted Posse has set the fourth program of competitive games here. Teams to be selected by each posse will represent it for points awarded at each of these Showdeos.

At the end of the year the team having the highest number of points is awarded an outstanding trophy by the State Posse Association, along with other prizes, consisting of minor trophies, belt buckles, etc.

Russian Jet Plane Fires On Airliner

French Craft Victim Of Attack Over Berlin; 2 Passengers Wounded

BERLIN — Two Russian jet fighters attacked an Air France commercial airliner with cannon and machinegun fire in the Allied air corridor over the Soviet zone Tuesday. Two German passengers were wounded and two crew members killed by bullets.

The airliner, enroute to Berlin with 11 passengers and six crewmen aboard, ducked behind cloud cover after the fighters made four passes. It reached Berlin's Tempelhof airport safely half an hour after the attack.

The fuselage was riddled, but fortunately none of the shots hit a vital part of the plane. None of the passengers or crewmen was an American.

The Allied high commission at Bonn sent a stern protest to the Soviet Control Commission immediately.

Commercial flights between Berlin and Western Germany were cancelled temporarily by Allied officials, but the embargo was lifted gradually a few hours later.

There was no immediate accounting for the attack. Since the 1948-49 Berlin blockade, traffic through the air corridors linking Berlin with Western Germany has been virtually free from alarms.

Youth Invasion Recalled

Last Thursday, however, about 25,000 blue-shirted Communist youth stormed at West Berlin's borders in a protest against the campaign to convince Western Germany it should discard links with Atlantic pact defense and listen to Moscow's promises of German unification and neutrality.

The demonstration resulted in several cracked heads and 14 arrests of youths who infiltrated the French sector.

The Air France office said the two wounded on the airliner were Mrs. Irmgard Nebel of Frankfurt, who was hit in the abdomen, and Walter Kurth of Bad Homburg, wounded in the arm and thigh.

Mrs. Nebel was taken to a hospital where pieces of 20-millimeter ammunition were removed.

The French pilot said he was flying precisely in the center of the air corridor over the Russian zone, when the two jets made four passes at him and unloaded bursts of cannon and machinegun fire.

The co-pilot and steward also were nicked by bullets.

"The attack was a complete surprise," said the pilot, "but there was no panic among the passengers."

N. Roseburg Sanitary District Sells Bonds

The North Roseburg Sanitary District announced that \$90,000 in general obligation bonds have been sold to a group of investment companies headed by the First National Bank of Portland. The interest rate will be 3 1/2 per cent. This combined group submitted the only bid.

The bonds are for enlargement of the North Roseburg District's sanitary lines to serve the areas to the north and west annexed to the district. The work will include extension of the trunk sewer mains as well as lines to serve the individual residences of the area.

The bonds are to be paid off over a period of 20 years.

Bids for construction are being advertised, and will be opened May 8 at 8 p.m. in the Riverside school.

Candidates must be between the ages of 15 and 23 years, either married or single. They must own their own horses and riding outfits. Entrants should contact DeBernardi or write to P.O. Box 927, the posse's postoffice address.

IKE IN EARLY LEAD

Forecasts Give Massachusetts Nod To General

MT. WASHINGTON, Mass. — This Berkshire county town, first to report in Tuesday's Massachusetts presidential preference primary gave Gen. Eisenhower 11 "write-in" votes to four for Sen. Taft or Ohio.

Gov. Warren of California received one of the 15 Republican votes cast.

On the Democratic side, Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee received the only vote cast.

BOSTON — In spite of cold, cloudy weather, a record-smashing Tuesday in the Massachusetts primary appeared to be building up, an election that could put Gen. Eisenhower on almost even terms with Sen. Taft in the race for the Republican presidential nomination.

Eisenhower is favored to win a majority of the 28 GOP convention delegates seats at stake, and to top Taft in the popular vote.

Some of Eisenhower's backers have claimed he would win all 28, but others place the figure at 20 to 24.

If their forecasts are accurate, Eisenhower will draw almost even with Taft in the box-score of delegates won up to this point in national campaigning.

Underwriting Of Centennial Will Be Sought

Throughout the day Wednesday, members of the Junior Chamber of Commerce will be calling on Roseburg merchants carrying the note form being used by the Douglas County Centennial Committee for the purpose of underwriting the coming pageant and festival.

This simple form allows each man or firm to subscribe his desired amount of underwriting on a pro-rata basis. No note will be in effect until the entire \$30,000 needed for the project is subscribed, according to Bob McCarl, chairman in charge.

Members of the Junior Chamber and the Centennial group expressed the belief that very little difficulty will be met in obtaining enough subscribing signatures, in view of the high enthusiasm already exhibited by most of Roseburg's people. Another apparent advantage to underwriters, said McCarl, is the low budget set up by the Centennial group, in spite of the proposed magnitude of the event.

Several thousand dollars have already been subscribed in advance of the solicitation by eager backers, stated McCarl. Any person or group wishing to underwrite for any amount may do so now by contacting Sid Moon, Junior Chamber president, at the California Oregon Power Co. office.

Eighteen years' past experience by Horace Robinson, manager-director of the coming event, have virtually proved the financial, as well as entertainment, success of shows of this type, he said.

Registered Multnomah Democrats' Lead Cut

PORTLAND — In Multnomah County registered Democrats outnumber Republicans by 16,338 to 10,749, Registrar James W. Gleason reported Monday.

That is a drop of almost 8,000 from the Democratic lead in the 1950 general election when the Democrats had a 24,082 margin.

Flood Crisis Poses Hard Utah Battle

Railroad Bridge, Dam Ripped Out, Salt Lake City Forms Canals

SALT LAKE CITY — Flood waters continued to rage down Utah's mountain canyons Tuesday as thousands of workers battled the state's worst flood crises in history.

The flood waters knocked out a railroad bridge, ripped out a dam, drove families from their homes, blocked highway traffic and continued to spread over farmlands.

Streets in Salt Lake City were sandbagged into emergency canals to carry off the overflow from several canyons to the east in the Wasatch Mountains.

The Jordan River, carrying the west side Salt Lake City runoff into the Great Salt Lake, spilled over its banks near the Salt Lake County fairgrounds early Tuesday.

"This is the most dangerous flood situation the city has ever faced," said City Engineer Roy W. McEese. "It's anybody's guess whether we can continue to control it."

Wearry flood workers received one assist early Tuesday. Temperatures dropped in Northern Utah and a cool wind raced in from the north. Officials expect this to ease melting of the state's record mountain snow pack.

The Utah floods form a patchwork pattern. It's quite unlike the Midwest floods when a major river knocks out levees along miles of its course. In Utah, several rivers and creeks are hammering at scattered areas. Other regions are free of floods.

Mayor Earl J. Glade named a committee to co-ordinate the work of fighting back the flood waters. He spoke of possible damages running as high as 10 million dollars.

Two major breaks, and several minor ones, allowed water to spill out of the canal running down 13th south from Fifth east to the Jordan River. As a result, a large west side section, including Derks Field, was covered with water.

New School Supt. Named In Roseburg

Mahlon C. Deller, superintendent of schools at Myrtle Creek, has accepted the position of superintendent of Roseburg District 4 schools, to succeed Paul S. Elliott, resigned.

Announcement of the selection was made today by V. V. Harpam, chairman of the District 4 board. The board took action at a special meeting last night, but waited for confirmation of Deller's acceptance before making the announcement.

Complete details on the appointment will be announced later.

Savings Bond Plan Revamped; Interest Upped

WASHINGTON — The Treasury Tuesday revamped its entire multi-billion dollar savings bond program, raising interest rates all along the line.

Sale of two of the current series of savings bonds — F and G bonds — will be discontinued effective Thursday. But three new types of bonds will be offered.

The familiar series "E" defense bonds — the type held by most individuals — will be continued. But interest rates for the full period of the bond will be raised from 2.9 per cent to 3 per cent.

And buyers will get a much bigger increase in interest rates over the first few years they hold the bond.

The changes will not affect "E" bonds already sold unless the bondholder wants to keep his bond after it matures. In that case, he will get the new interest rate of 3 per cent.

Secretary of the Treasury Snyder said the many changes are designed to improve the bond program "in keeping with the times" — apparently a reference to increased commercial interest rates. Snyder said a sampling of opinion has indicated the changes "will be very popular."

NON-SUPPORT CHARGED

40,000 CIO Employees Stop Work

Operators Balk At Paying Cost Of Health Plan

PORTLAND — Logging halted in most of the Pacific Northwest Tuesday as more than 40,000 CIO woodworkers began a strike against some 700 employers.

The midnight strike deadline had been set by workers of Northern California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Western Montana to back up their demands for improved contracts.

The walkout began minutes before last-hour negotiations with the Willamette Valley Operators Association collapsed. Two years ago the Willamette Valley operators settled with the union only a few hours before the strike deadline. That kept workers on the job and other employers settled along similar lines.

But Willamette Valley operators Monday night "made no better offer," A.F. Hartung, international president of the union, said.

That was the third turn down the union has had on its contract demands.

Health Program Is Snag

The Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee, an employer group representing a large part of the union's 7 1/2 cent hourly increase, the industry, earlier offered three additional paid holidays—making a total of six—and a 2-cent hourly increase in night differentials.

But the companies balked at the added demand they pay the cost of a health and welfare program which would amount to about 3 1/2 cents a work hour.

Then Monday afternoon the union met with Plywood Mill operators. Hartung said the employers' only offer was to continue the old contract. It provided for a 7 1/2-cent increase in the cost of the health and welfare program.

That left the union on strike against the entire industry with the exception of Weyerhaeuser operations. Weyerhaeuser settled earlier this spring by continuing to finance the welfare program, granting the three holidays, paying the 7 1/2-cent hourly increase and the increased night differential.

AFL Opens Parleys

Unless settled soon, the strike is expected to affect the operation of Pacific Northwest Lumber mills, many of them with AFL crews.

Meantime the AFL Monday opened its negotiations for new contracts. At a meeting with the Lumbermen's Industrial Relations Committee union negotiators asked for a 30-cent hourly increase. After the demand was presented the meeting was recessed subject to call by either the union or employers.

The LIRC represented Columbia River and Oregon Coastal employers at the Monday talks.

No strike deadline has been set by the AFL union.

Paul S. Elliott To Head Schools At Oakridge

Paul S. Elliott, who has resigned as superintendent of Roseburg School District 4, announced that he has accepted a similar position at Oakridge School District 76.

Elliott said he would take over at the Lane County school, located 40 miles east of Eugene on the Willamette Highway, after his term expires here July 1.

Oakridge is a first class school district with census of around 1100, about the same as Roseburg had when he took over here in 1944, said Elliott. The teaching staff numbers about 40.

But the district is growing there, the same as here, and the building program is already underway in that rapidly developing timber and sawmilling town, he said. A grade school is to be built this summer, and plans are underway for the construction of a new high school, possibly next year.

The board has set May 22 at 8 p.m. as the date for opening of bids for construction of an eight-classroom addition at Fullerton School, a multipurpose building at Riverside. Bids may be submitted separately or jointly on the two projects.
