serve the earlier rising. Most local stores now open at 9:30 a. m. and close at 5:30 p. m. The change would place their hours at 8:30 and 4:30, respectively.

Industries, in general, are expected to recognize the earlier hour for starting. One manager said plans were already made to begin operations at 7 a. m. instead of 8. Woods operations are usually advanced to start about daylight during the summer season, because of fire hazards in the middle of the day.

Dr. John Haskins, manager of the Veterans Hospital, said the earlier hour will be adopted for its work schedule.

Legal restrictions, however, prevent the courthouse from making a change, in the opinion of the county court. The same applies to the municipal court and to the recorder's office, said City Manager W. A. Gilchrist. Police and fire departments are on a round-the-clock basis anyhow. The postoffice can make no arbitrary change.

Contempt Conviction Of Rumely Thrown Out
WASHINGTON — The U. S. Court of Appeals Tuesday threw out the contempt of congress conviction of Dr. Edward A. Rumely, victim of Dr. Edward A. Rumely, executive secretary of the Committee for Constitutional Government.

Rumely was convicted by a jury in U. S. District Court last year after he refused to produce records demanded by the House Lobby Investigating committee.

The Court of Appeals ruled 2-1 that the House resolution creating the committee did not give the group authority to require the records it demanded be turned over to it.

The committee had ordered Rumely to produce the names of all persons who had made purchases of books worth \$500 or more from the Committee for Constitutional Government.
