**Wool Values Increase On Australian Mart**

SYDNEY (AP)—Australian wool values rose strongly Monday when Sydney sales resumed after the Easter recess.

The Sydney wool selling brokers association said the market, compared with closing rates at the previous Sydney sales, was generally ten per cent higher for Merino descriptions.

Most Sydney wool brokers believe the market has reached stability after an almost continuous decline for one year.

**Whites, Negroes To Join In Church Congregation**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—Two San Francisco Presbyterian congregations—one entirely Negro, the other entirely white—are forming a single church under a Negro pastor.

The minister, The Rev. Wesley L. Hawes, announced the unanimous decision of both congregations Friday as "a firm, tangible demonstration of our Christian democracy at the time it is being criticized."

His 60 Negro parishioners shortly will move from their crowded, dilapidated, store-like facilities at Hope Presbyterian to worship with the 40 members of Westminster Presbyterian who have a spacious old church.

Dr. Hawes explained many of his expanding congregation were moving toward the neighborhood of Westminster Church, a dozen blocks away.

THE ILLUSTRATION SHOWN indicates how the principle of supply and demand works in establishing lumber prices. When the demand for lumber is big, the supply goes down and prices naturally tend to go up. When demand falls off, the supply increases and lumber prices go down.
