

Indians Edge Myrtle Creek, 4 to 3

Vikings Outhit Roseburg But Scoring Fails

Singles, Walks, Error Give Indians Winning Runs In Third Inning

The Myrtle Creek Vikings outhit Hal Zacher's Roseburg High School baseball nine Tuesday, but couldn't overcome a big four-run burst by the Indians in the third inning. The Indians won, 4-3.

Roseburg's Ralph Rudzik made his debut as a pitcher and gave up six hits but they were so scattered, the hosting Vikings didn't get a run until the sixth.

A rash of singles, two walks and an error put the game on ice for the Indians in the third. With one out, Rudzik started his own rally by singling. This shook Viking Pitcher LeRoy McCauley, and he walked Don Stumbo and Gordon Wiley to fill the bases. Jerry Parmer met the challenge by singling to center to bring in the first run. Steve Dancho brought in Stumbo with another single, and Ron Hicks sent McCauley to the showers with still another single, this time for two runs.

Outcome Uncertain

That was the game for the Indians, but ever-present hitting power and the brilliant left-handed hurling of Ron Phillips made the outcome far from certain. Phillips gave up only one hit from the time he took over in the third.

The first Myrtle Creek run came across in the sixth when Dick Komp rapped a double to center that got through the fielder's legs. He circled the bases.

In the seventh, Coach Hal Zacher, decided to get the kinks out of Wayne Wilcher's arm. This almost proved disastrous for the Indians, because Wilcher was wild as a March hare. He walked the first two men and gave up a double for one run. It put the tying tally on second. Dick Komp walked to fill the bases and Don Gillespie drew a free pass to force in the second run in the inning. All three men on bases, however, died on a high fly to left field.

In spite of giving up six of the seven hits, Rudzik was only in trouble once before the sixth. The first two men in the game who faced him singled, but the threat died at first and second. He didn't give up a walk and struck out four men before Wilcher came in. Dick Komp led all batters with two hits in three trips to the plate.

Fletcher Whiffs 10 Batters In Tuesday's Play

Grumph Guy Fletcher, the 42-year-old right hander who has been cut adrift by three Pacific Coast League clubs in recent years, is still one of the canniest chuckers in the loop.

He whiffed 10 batters Tuesday night in hurling the league leading San Diego Padres to a 4-0 win over San Francisco.

The victory made him the only twirler besides Seattle's Charley Schanz to win four games this season and hoisted his strikeout mark to 34, second only to the 36 posted by Elmer Singleton of San Francisco.

Fletcher limited the Seals to four hits and was in trouble only in the fourth, when San Francisco with one away, loaded the bases on singles by Joe Grace and Ray Ortig and a walk. But Fletcher fanned Jim Moran and Pitcher Singleton grounded out to retire the side.

The sacks were stacked on Jim Russell's infield hit, an error on Joe Brovia's bouncer, and a walk to Clint Conatser. The Beavers scored twice on a balk and a ground-out before Gettel tightened and worked himself out of the jam. Seattle spoiled Los Angeles' homecoming when Clarence Mader's long fly in the tenth scored Pete Pavlick, ending the overtime 2-1. Walt Judnich tallied from third for Seattle's first run on a long fly by Bob Wilson. The Angels' only run, unearned, was scored by Red Hollis when Ray Talbot's grounder rolled through Judnich's legs.

North Division Scramble Tied

The Northern Division baseball scramble was tied at both ends Wednesday with Washington in the middle holding an even split.

The Huskies edged Oregon 6-5 in 10 innings Tuesday for their first win in four starts in the Willamette Valley. At the same time, Washington State clipped Idaho 7-2.

Washington's victory at Eugene was the fourth of the season for the Huskies against four losses. It left Oregon, formerly alone in first place, tied with Oregon State, each with four wins and two losses. And Washington State, posting its second straight win and third of the season, tied Idaho in last place. Each team has five losses.

Three Oregon errors in the top of the 10th inning landed Washington in the win column at Eugene. Ron Halle's sacrifice on top of the miscues sent the winning run across the plate. Washington led 5-3 going into the ninth. Earl Averill's single scoring Bill Bottler and Joe Segura's single driving in Jim Livesay put the game in overtime. Both Bottler and Livesay walked.

Curt Simmons Lifts Gloom From Phillies

Hurls 8-2 Easy Victory Over Cubs; Dodgers Turn Back Cardinals

Cold and rain continued to paralyze baseball in the east and a strike threatened to black out a park in the West but followers of the Philadelphia Phillies could find no gloom anywhere Wednesday — Curt Simmons is back and he's in the groove.

The hard-throwing, 22-year-old lefthander, three weeks out of the Army, made his first Major League start in 19 months Tuesday and proceeded to tame the Chicago Cubs with a smooth seven-hit performance, 8-2.

No Change Seen

He didn't look any different from the trim, young southpaw whose blazing fast ball won 17 games for the Phillies and helped lead them to the National League pennant before Uncle Sam snatched him up in September, 1950.

In the season's first head-on collision of East and West, the favored Brooklyn Dodgers strengthened their grip on the National League lead by turning back the St. Louis Cardinals on the masterful clutch pitching of Preacher Roe, 4-1.

The game was delayed 65 minutes by a strike of AFL bartenders who threw a picket line around St. Louis' Sportsman's park.

Dodgers Up Lead

The Dodgers thus increased their lead to a game and a half over both Chicago and Cincinnati Reds, who fell victim to the New York Giants at Cincinnati, 2-1.

In the other National League game Warren Spahn, the Boston Braves' crack lefty, nailed Pittsburgh tighter to the cellar by humbling the Pirates, 5-1, on five hits.

Only one game was played in the American League as unseasonably cold and wet grounds, which already have cost Eastern clubs more than a quarter of a million dollars, forced three more postponements.

The Single American League Conflict

The Cleveland Indians won, 21-9, in a wild slugfest that saw the two teams pound out a total of 43 hits, 25 of them by the Indians. The veteran Bob Feller, who lost a double one-hitter on his last outing to St. Louis' Bob Cain, won this one although he gave up 18 safeties and went all the way. Alex Kellner was the loser.
