DAVID SAND, Elgarose farmer, standing beside it, a 35-year-old mare which has survived not only that many winters (half of them in North Dakota, at that) but one summer much hotter than any other she has seen—last summer, the summer of the big forest fire in the Elgarose hills. ## Success In Sales Of Merchandise Will Count In Choice Of Centennial Queen, Award Of \$500 Scholarship

The vote-getting campaign for the Centennial princess program got under way this morning—spurred by the report that 20 businesses and individuals stand ready to buy \$10 each worth of merchandise from the first candidate that comes along.

The candidates, their managers and others attended a meeting last night for instructions and to obtain \$100 worth of merchandise each.

Among the articles the candidates will sell to procure votes at \$3 five cents per, are Umpqua Cavalcade emblems, automobile bumper strips, souvenir ash trays, and embossed seals. Centennial note paper and neckties are expected to be available later.

Horace Robinson, manager-director of the Centennial event, announced he had contacted 10 businesses and 10 individuals who have agreed to buy \$10 worth of merchandise from the first enterprising princess candidate who contacts them.

The princess contest continues until June 14. Standings will be announced by the queen committee at four-day intervals. The announced standings will be on the basis of cash turned in.

The seven girls who sell the most will be rated according to their sales, and automatically become princesses. The rating will be on one-fourth of the total evaluation in the queen contest.

Selection will also include a beauty and talent contest scheduled for Aug. 1 at either the Junior or Senior High School Auditorium. Voting will also be held by purchasers of tickets to the talent and beauty contest and to the queen's ball, at which the name of the chosen queen will be announced.

The queen will receive a \$500 scholarship or advanced study in a field and at a place of her own selection.

The seven princesses will each receive a western costume, a pioneer costume and a formal for the queen's ball.

## Ike, Kefauver Are Preferred In Roseburg Poll

If the primary election were to be held today, Eisenhower could expect 67 per cent of the Republican vote in the Roseburg area, while Kefauver would almost match it with 64 per cent of the Democratic vote, according to a telephone poll conducted by The Associated Press by The News-Review.

The procedure followed similar polls conducted by The Associated Press in New Hampshire, Wisconsin, Nebraska and Illinois, where forecasts proved fairly accurate. Similar checks are being made in other Oregon counties to be compiled into a state-wide poll.

The News-Review's poll reveals that about 25 per cent of the voters of both parties are still undecided. About 12 per cent of all voters polled reported they do not expect to vote in the primaries. Some are not registered.

Of the Democrats responding, approximately 10 per cent said they would vote for Eisenhower, 22 per cent for Kefauver, 18 per cent for Taft, 8 per cent for Warren, and 3 per cent for Stassen.

Sixty-four per cent of the Democrats giving their voting preference are for Kefauver, with 18 per cent each for Douglas and Stevenson.

## Roseburg Lumber Plant Is Damaged By Fire

The Roseburg plant of Roseburg Lumber Co. will resume operations Friday, after being closed today for repairs.

Fire about 8 p.m. Wednesday damaged the conveyor leading to the burner, causing the temporary shutdown, said Manager Earl Plummer. Sparks, caused by friction when a pulley broke, ignited planking beneath the conveyor. The flames were soon controlled, and the damage held to a minimum, it was reported.

## Appeals Court Reverses Ban On Steel Seizure

### Government Gets 5-4 Nod To Up Wages

Revolving Door Status Faced By All Involved, Commerce Head Says

WASHINGTON (AP)—The U. S. Court of Appeals by a 5 to 4 vote refused Thursday to bar the government from raising wages of steel workers while it holds the seized mills.

The vote denying a plea from major steel companies that the court enjoin Secretary of Commerce Sawyer from doing anything about wages and working conditions was the same as that by which the court returned the steel plants to government control Wednesday night.

Only a few minutes before the court decision was announced, Sawyer had said in a statement he did not intend to take any "precipitate" action about wages.

The government manager of the steel mills said the situation was so fluid that "the employees and I myself, and the operators, too, are at the moment in a revolving door. We are neither coming in nor going out."

New Parleys Requested Sawyer also called in his statement for:

1. New negotiations by the industry and the CIO Steelworkers Union looking toward a bargained settlement of their differences.

2. Action by Congress to give the government some clear legal basis for dealing with situations such as the steel strike has created.

He said: "We are now facing up to a situation which has long been impending where a titanic struggle between giant industry and giant labor results in a paralysis in which our whole economic and social life may be at stake."

"It is time for the Congress to meet that situation calmly, wisely and promptly."

New Up To Supreme Court In the steel towns, the mills were closed up tight and union pickets were stationed about them.

However, Sawyer said he did not feel the men were now on strike against the government since their walkout came when U. S. District Judge David A. Pine ruled on Tuesday that the government seizure was illegal and the mills must be returned to their owners.

The government got an order from the Court of Appeals Wednesday which has the effect of holding up Pine's order pending an appeal to the Supreme Court.

The steel companies went back to this court Thursday to plead for an amendment of the order so that the government could not boost wages while holding the mills.

Sawyer Not Hasty The court of Appeals' action Thursday leaves the government free to work out an agreement with the steelworkers.

Sawyer, meeting with reporters, amplified on his statement by saying he would do nothing "with-in the next day or two" in the way of putting a wage increase into effect in the government-seized industry.

"I will make my decision when the situation settles down," Sawyer added.

"My role at the moment, as I see it, is to preserve an objective point of view—to try to create a climate or state of mind where a settlement between the industry and the union is possible."

He said he has no specific recommendations now as to what the wage or price settlement should be.

Prizes of \$75, \$30 and \$10 are being offered for the first three places in both the commercial and non-commercial entries.

The out-of-town entries are being eliminated this year. Chairman V. J. Anderson said, and such establishments will enter instead in either the commercial or non-commercial classifications.

An additional prize of \$25 will be offered for the grand sweepstakes award.

Commercial entries will be charged a fee of \$15. There will be no fee for non-commercial entries consisting of fraternities, sororities, civic clubs, churches and all non-profit organizations.

### Stalin Views Annual Strut Of Red Might

Army Leader Repeats Germ Warfare Charge Against United States

MOSCOW (AP)—Generalissimo Stalin, looking much as usual, reviewed the annual parade of Soviet labor and armed might Thursday from Lenin's marble tomb and heard one of his marshals publicly accuse the United States of germ warfare in Korea and China.

The 72-year-old Soviet leader halted once on his way up the long flight of steps, waving to Russian spectators and foreign diplomats looking up at him from the sunlit stands.

Then he turned and climbed the rest of the way to the reviewing tribune closely attended by 50-year-old Georgi M. Malenkov, a deputy premier and member of the Politburo.

(After the lavish celebration of Malenkov's birthday last January, many western observers believed he had been picked as Stalin's successor.)

Marshal Leonid A. Govorov, wartime commander of the Leningrad army, made an anti-Western speech to troops massed in Red Square. He said the Soviet armed forces will deal a "devastating blow to any attempt of imperialist aggressors to interrupt the peaceful and creative labors of the Soviet people."

Russian Lie Repeated Standing by Stalin, he asserted: "In a mockery of international agreements, the American barbarians are carrying out the greatest crime against humanity—making use of bacteriological weapons in Korea and China."

Until now, no marshal of the Soviet Union had accused the United States of germ warfare, although Moscow newspapers have made the charge repeatedly.

(The United States has repeatedly denied the Communist charges and proposed that the International Red Cross make an investigation in Korea and China but the Communists have derisively refused the proposal.)

Peoples 'Don't Want War' "The Anglo-American aggressors and their henchmen continued their armaments race," said Govorov. "They are reviving German imperialism in the West and Japanese imperialism in the East."

"But," Govorov said, "the imperialist policy of the Anglo-American aggressive bloc does not and cannot have the support of the peoples because the peoples do not want war."

The parade featured the usual impressive lineup of tanks, artillery and rocket launchers. Files of smart foot soldiers tramped past with hands playing.

Stalin's son, Air Force Lt. Gen. Vasily Stalin, piloted a four-engine bomber at the head of the air show over Red Square.

Behind him came dozens of jet planes, most of them MIGs, distinctively painted on the noses with red, blue or pink.

They roared and zoomed in acrobatic display overhead, filling the great square with their sounds. Below, the watching Russians bowed cheer after cheer.

## 20,000 Battle Tokyo Police For 5 Hours

Hundreds On Both Sides Injured, Damage Dealt To American Property

TOKYO (AP)—Twenty thousand Communist-led anti-American rioters fought police with clubs and stones in front of the Imperial Palace Thursday.

It was the worst riot in Japan since the end of the World War and the first in which American property was damaged.

Americans were attacked, stoned, mauled. But none was seriously hurt.

Club-swinging rioters charged 1,000 steel-helmeted police three times. They clubbed 218 officers to the ground, injuring 31 seriously.

But each time the police beat back the human waves with tear gas, clubs and guns fired into the ground.

Uncounted hundreds of rioters also were injured. One was reported killed by gunfire.

Riots also broke out in Kyoto, templed former capital of Japan, 230 miles southwest of Tokyo. There 3,000 Koreans stormed city offices and fought with police. They were halted by tear gas. Seventeen rioters were arrested.

A U.S. embassy spokesman said no official protest was contemplated as a result of the Tokyo riot. Americans Manhandled Demonstrators stormed through the streets shouting anti-American slogans, waving Red banners and carrying pictures of Stalin and other Communist leaders.

Order was restored after five hours.

Twelve American-owned automobiles were overturned and burned. Americans were shoved and hit by rocks. Two U. S. sailors were thrown into the palace moat. The wife of a Navy man was mugged.

Two American photographers were roughed up. Associated Press Photographer George Swears was stoned three times.

The brawling halted traffic for three hours in front of the palace and the Dai Ichi building, for nearly a week. The meeting was broken up by a gang of North Korean and Japanese Communists. The speeches were canceled.
