Mother Classes Scheduled Here

Mother classes under the sponsorship of the Douglas County Health Department will be held for six weeks starting next Monday afternoon at the Junior High School.

The classes are scheduled for each Monday, each starting at 2:30 p.m. and lasting two hours, according to Miss Lavenia Fulton, health department nurse in charge of arrangements.

Participating in the classes will be nurses, County Health Officer Dr. E. J. Wainwright, and Mrs. Robert Stein, state nutritionist.

The classes are open to all mothers—past, present and future—and even to fathers, if they'd care to attend, Miss Fulton said.

Next Monday's session will include introductory remarks on growth of a baby and pre-birth hygiene.

Mrs. Stein is slated to appear at the May 12, class, while on May 19 Dr. Wainwright will speak on "Understanding How a Baby is Born."

On May 26 Mrs. Mary Barrett, health department nurse, will discuss the needs of the mother after the baby is born, and a week later Miss Marian Davis, nurse, will talk on the requirements of a new baby.

The final session on June 9 will deal with the technique of the baby's bath and other demonstrations.

Girls Start Signing Up For Outing At Tye

Camp Fire and Blue Bird girls of the Roseburg area began registrations for the summer camping sessions at their Camp Tye Thursday, May 1.

Registrations will continue through May for all members of Blue Bird and Camp Fire groups. If vacancies exist after June 1, non-Camp Fire members may register for camp. Motion For New Trial In Damage Suit Denied

Motion for a new trial for three-year-old Riddle girl injury, in an accident involving a rural mail carrier was overruled Wednesday by Circuit Judge Carl E. Wimberly.

The motion had been filed by attorney for L. Bert Owens, father of 3-year-old Marthine, who, it was claimed, was injured when struck by a pickup truck driven by Walter R. Holmes, rural mail carrier.

Attorneys for both parties stipulated Thursday that they would make no legal arguments before Judge Wimberly in the motion. The judge then denied the new trial. In a trial last March 6, Judge Wimberly had directed a verdict in favor of Holmes.

Progressive Education, Topic Of Sen. Walker

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Walker declared he didn't believe in it.

"If we send one dollar to Washington, we get 75 cents back," he said. "I'd rather spend the entire dollar in Oregon."

He further explained that federal aid usually brings federal control. "He who owns the whip calls the tune," still holds so far as I'm concerned," he said.

Asked about an Oregon sales tax, Walker replied that because of the state's referendum law, it was doubtful that one would pass. "There's no case on record where the people have ever voted a sales tax," he said.

One-Sided Emphasis Seen

Grants Pass School Supt. Jones, participating in a later panel discussion, commented that one of the weaknesses of Oregon high schools was "too much emphasis on the retarded students and not enough on the bright students who will be the leaders of tomorrow."

In discussing "progressive education" he said the layman's usual conception of it was the teaching on the basis of experience where the fundamentals—"such as adding two and two"—come up "incidentally and accidentally."

In answer to another question he said he felt it advisable to broaden school curriculums to keep students interested in school. Earlier, Eugene Fisher, Elkton School Board member, cited an example of a student whose grades improved when the school added manual training which was more to his liking than the academic subjects.

Steelworkers' Strike Ended On Truman's Plea

the case would go back to the Court of Appeals here.

Truman's move for a White House conference with both sides seemed obviously aimed at trying to get them to agree on a working contract.

If this should develop, the Supreme Court might refuse to consider the case.

The President appealed Thursday night for the steel workers to get back on the job as "loyal Americans."

By implication at least, his request carried notice too that if they did not the government might use the Taft-Hartley labor act and seek a court order for their return.

"The government is now in a position to continue the operation of the steel mills in the national interest," Truman said in a telegram made public shortly before midnight.

Union Stands Pat
In Pittsburgh, Murray told reporters he was hopeful the White House conference "will result in something conclusive."

He said the union would stand firm on its demands for contract changes in line with the Wage Stabilization Board's recommendations.

The board recommended a "package increase" of 26 cents an hour for the steelworkers who now average slightly under \$2 an hour.
