Use Sunglasses This Summer, Drivers Advised

Oregon drivers will be safer this summer if they purchase and use dark sunglasses for daytime driving, according to information received by the secretary of state's traffic safety division.

Research conducted by Temple University's School of Medicine and reported to the Highway Research Council shows exposure to sunlight without sunglasses definitely results in a loss of vision at night. While this loss has little effect during the day, it prevents drivers from seeing objects at night until they are dangerously close, the report said.

Tests of several drivers near Phoenix, Arizona showed that some could see well enough to handle speeds up to 60 miles an hour at night with reasonable safety while others reached the safety limit at 40, under equal conditions. Men relatively safe at 60 miles an hour had worn sunglasses during six hours of daylight driving preceding the night tests, while the others had driven without them.

The study, conducted by R. H. Peckham, associate professor of research ophthalmology at Temple, concluded that adequate sunglasses worn during the day would reduce loss of "retinal sensitivity" at night and thus help reduce after-dark traffic smash-ups.

What constitutes "adequate sunglasses?" Peckham says the darker the better, but adds that "any type, at any price, of any color will be helpful to drivers if worn during the day to protect the retina and prepare it for the difficulties of seeing at night with car headlights."

\$50,000 Damages Asked In Personal Injury Suit

Martin Brothers Box Co. was named defendant Wednesday in a \$50,000 personal injury suit filed by Edward M. Carter.

Carter alleges he received a permanent wrist injury while working for the company May 5, 1950. His complaint states he was injured when a debarking machine struck a knot causing a hand control lever to fly up. Carter says he had his hand on the lever and alleges partial loss of use of his right hand and wrist.

Special damages of \$3,303 are also asked.

Violation Of Sanitary Regulations Charged

Mrs. E. E. Winter, Pacific Highway South, posted \$75 bail Wednesday in district court after her arrest by sheriff's deputies on a charge of "unlawful disposal of sewage."

In a complaint signed by County Sanitarian T. Claude Baker, she is accused of allowing untreated septic tank effluent to flow on the ground.

She is to appear before District Judge A. J. Geddes today.

Oregon Schools Advised To Keep Standard Time

SALEM (AP) The State Department of Education said Wednesday it is advising Oregon schools to remain on standard time, but pointed out that school boards have power to fix other hours.

Lester Wilcox, assistant state superintendent of public instruction, said his office has received many telephone calls from school boards wanting advice on the time question.

Viola Hansen will succeed Miss Clinton as assistant home economics extension leader.
