Kentucky Derby Runoff Today

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Seventeen three-year-old colts, as finely tuned as a concert violin, challenged one another in the 78th running of the \$125,350 Kentucky Derby Saturday.

It'll take hardly more than two minutes for them to cover Churchill Downs' sun-baked derby route of a mile and one quarter. But in that brief period will be packed all the hopes and disappointments of three years of careful training for these thoroughbreds in America's No. 1 horse race.

Some already have acquired a degree of greatness through two-year-old and early season triumphs. Others have yet to visit the winner's circle this year. But they all are survivors of an original field of 167 once nominated for this turf classic.

A crowd estimated at 100,000 again was expected to pack the vast stands and the flower-decorated infield that is Churchill Downs.

Millions of others also will see the race; the run for the roses is being televised nationally for the first time. It will be carried over 49 stations by CBS-TV and broadcast on radio by the same network.

Both the telecast and broadcast are scheduled for 2:15 p.m. to 2:45 p.m., Pacific Daylight time. Post time is 2:30 p.m.

College Baseball Track Teams Vie

Favored Washington took on Idaho in a track meet Saturday while Oregon State aimed at solidifying its first place hold in Northern Division baseball in the second game of a two-game series at Moscow.

While Washington was expected to defeat Idaho in the Seattle track meet, the visiting Vandals may come up with the individual winner in Bruce Sweeney.

Competing against him will be Washington's George Widenfolt, who aims to represent Sweden in this summer's Olympic Games.

Oregon State took undisputed grip on first place in the Northern Division baseball standings Friday by swamping Idaho 16-5 in a series opener. The Beavers pelted out 18 hits, coasting to victory after a nine-run second inning which included a two-ply homer by Catcherohn Thomas.

The Beavers made it a clean sweep over Idaho in spring sports Friday, beating the Vandals at Corvallis in tennis and golf. The OSC golf team won 19 1/2 to 7 1/2 and the tennis team 7-0. Keith Osborn of the Beavers was medalist in golf with a three-over-par 75.

At Eugene, meanwhile, Oregon bested Washington State 23 1/2 to 3 in another golf match. Fred Mueller of Oregon was medalist with a 69.

when the strike of 22 CIO, AFL, and independent unions began at midnight Tuesday.

Meanwhile, there was little progress in plant-by-plant negotiations. The coalition of unions, headed by the Oil Workers International Union in Denver, is seeking a 25-cent hourly wage hike and increased night shift differentials.

Filling station pumps slowly were running dry in a few scattered midwestern areas. In Denver, some independent chains started a gasoline war with prices dropping two cents a gallon.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is striving to stave off runs on filling stations as a result of the oil workers' strike.

While labor and management officials continue efforts to reach new wage contracts, federal officials are taking pains to calm public fears.

From nearly every quarter come statements emphasizing that reserve stocks of fuels are at record highs—sufficient, they say, to permit normal consumption for several weeks. The officials also point out that runs on filling stations not only would result in waste but would create fire hazards through unsafe storage of gasoline on private premises.
