Truman To Abide By Final Ruling On Steel Seizure

WASHINGTON — President Truman said Thursday he will take every action possible to get the steel strike settled. But the President declined at his news conference to give any clue as to what he may have in mind doing in an effort to get steel production going. In reply to a question, the President said without qualification that he would abide by whatever decision the Supreme Court may make in the litigation over his seizure of the steel mills. The President also told reporters: 1. That if he should be nominated by the Democrats as their presidential candidate, he would not run, he would say no. 2. That Gen. Eisenhower is as fine a man as ever walked. The President had been asked what he thought of a report that Eisenhower was a sick man. He's not anything of the kind, the President said, and added the general is as fine a man that ever walked. He went on to say Eisenhower is just beginning to find out what happens in politics, and that the attacks on the general now are mild. 3. Praised Sen. McMahon (D-Conn.) who announced for the presidential nomination as qualified for the job. Truman added it looks like now we are going to get some good candidates.
