Kentucky Derby Winner's Hopes Still Need Test

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Hill Gail's hopes of becoming king of the three-year-olds seemed to hinge Monday on how well he can meet two upcoming issues.

Everybody agreed his performance in winning Saturday's Kentucky Derby stamped him a steed of unusual promise, one that might walk away with the championship honors.

But before he can sit in the throne room of such former kings as Citation, Whirlaway, Count Fleet and Assault, he must:

1. Show that he can go the longer distances, such as the mile and one-half route of the Belmont Stakes later this spring.
2. Prove that he's master of other three-year-olds that weren't ready for the Derby, including Tom Fool, Primrose and Charlie McAdam.

He left no doubt that he was master of the 15 that tried to run with him in the Derby. It was the ease with which he left them behind that had several observers along shed row at Churchill Downs singing his praise.

North Bend Relay Team Wins A Division Meet

Results of the 880-yard relay, won by North Bend was omitted in Saturday's News-Review from the winner list in Friday's track meet in the A division.

Running on the winning team were Allen Sutton, Carlisle Stuart, Cleo Crutchfield and Jim Shanley. In second place was Sutherland, followed in order by Marshfield, Reedport, Roseburg and Myrtle Point. The time was 1:41.2.

Washington Trims Idaho, Cougars Tip Oregon State

Meet records tumbled as Washington downed Idaho and Washington State defeated Oregon State in Northern Division track meets Saturday.

Washington drubbed the Vandals 88½-42½ at Seattle, and WSC dropped the Beavers 94½-36½ at Pullman.

Five meet records were broken and a sixth was tied at Seattle. Idaho's Lou Gourley set a new mark of 9:27.4 in the two mile and the Vandals' Dick Newton was clocked at 21.7 in the 220 for a new standard.

Washington's George Widenfelt and Ken Morgan and the Huskies' relay team also set records. Widenfelt cleared the high jump at 6 feet 4½ inches. Morgan was timed in the half mile at 1:53.6 and the relay team marked up a record 3:21. Bob Hutchinson tied the meet record of 9.8 in the 100.

A meet record that had stood for 21 years was one of the four wiped out at Pullman. Clint Richardson of WSC ran the 220 in 21.5 seconds, a tenth of a second faster than the old mark set by Elle of OSC in 1931.

Other records were set by Bob Gary of WSC, who ran the 100 in 9:85; by Fischer of WSC, the two-mile in 9:30.2, and by Roberts of WSC, the high jump, 6 feet 4½ inches.

Winter Steelhead Migration Second Best Since Count Began 6 Years Ago

Winter steelhead migration showing much activity in April, has regained its place as the second best since counting started in 1946.

William E. Pitney, game department field agent, reports 655 fish tallied at Winchester during the last two weeks of the month, bringing the season total as of May 1 to 9,827, second only to the 1947 1 to 11,220 fish. The next best year was 1948 with a total of 9,700. In that year 8,951 fish had passed the counting station by May 1.

A lag in migration during the month of March had observers worried, but the heavy movement in April overcame the deficiency.

Chinook migration has been slow with only 188 fish over the counting board during the last two weeks of April bringing the season total to 198. Chinook movement, however, varies with water conditions. As the water level has been high and temperature low, it is believed that the run is late and will gain in tempo.

High Schools Request Co-operation Of Colleges In Abolishing 'Evils' Of Bidding For Promising Athletes

SEATTLE (AP) — Seeking the co-operation of college conferences, the high schools of America have outlined a policy aimed at eradicating the evils which result from the bidding by college alumni groups for the services of young athletes.

Henry DeYoung, secretary of the Washington High School Athletic Association, said Wednesday the program could be effective only if colleges chose to go along.

A statement by the National Federation of state associations said the evil "which accompanies the ostentatious banqueting and transportation of athletes is familiar to high school administrators."

"It took a series of sports scandals," the Federation said, "to awaken college administrators and the general public to the need for action."

Among the points suggested in the policy statement:

1. Tryouts of high school athletes should not be permitted and the entertainment and transportation of boys to college campuses to display athletic prowess should be prohibited.
2. Standards for admissions to higher institutions should apply to the athletic and non-athletic alike.
3. Only bona fide students who are satisfied recognized educational standards in high school or college should be permitted to compete in athletics.
4. All financial aid to students should be based on demonstrated ability in high school subjects and activities.

Under the latter these six additional points were listed:

- A. No athletic "scholarships" as such should be awarded.
- B. All scholarships aid must be administered by the institution and not by alumni, civic groups or other individuals.
- C. Each institution should publish qualifications for all scholarships offered.
- D. Scholarships should be limited to actual expenses for tuition, fees, room, board.
- E. Payment for employment should be made only when services are rendered.
- F. No grant should be withdrawn because of failure to participate in athletics.

Stanford Orphan Crews Defeat Beavers Twice

CORVALLIS—Stanford crews—known as orphans because they receive no financial help from the university—defeated Oregon State twice on a 2,000 meter course in the Willamette River Saturday.

They won the varsity event by four lengths in 9:56 minutes and the junior varsity event by three lengths in 10:40 minutes. They used shells borrowed from Oregon State.

In 63 years of football competition, the Notre Dame gridders have won 399 games, lost 83 and tied 32.

The University of Florida has been a member of the Southeastern Conference ever since that athletic group was founded in 1933.

MORE WEAR FROM PRINTS

Another springtime phenomenon — prints.

The important thing to consider here is whether or not the print is fast. If it is fugitive, you're in for trouble.

THE BEST PRECAUTION — AND ONE THAT "WORKS" 100% OF THE TIME — IS TO DEMAND A GUARANTEE FROM THE MERCHANT THAT THE PRINT IN QUESTION IS COLOR FAST. IF HE CANNOT ASSURE YOU, DON'T BUY IT.

Printed jersey is one of the worst offenders in fugitive prints. While not all printed jerseys are unserviceable, there are enough of them on the market so you'd be wise to be cautious.

Nylon print is often found which is unserviceable. Here again perhaps the best recommendation we can make is that you demand color fastness from your merchant.

Uncured prints. In general, the whole subject of prints could be summarized under this one heading. Almost any printed fabric can stand ordinary cleaning procedures — with the exception of bleaching and staining — if the dyes used have been properly "fixed". This ordinarily means both curing the print for the prescribed length of time at the right temperature, using the proper mordant or fixing agent. Again, the best recommendation is: **DEMAND PROPER GUARANTEE FROM YOUR MERCHANT.** If you don't get it, don't buy it. There are enough good materials — prints, too — on the market which are fast color.

Bucky Harris' Senators In Lead Battle

Ex-Yankees Spark Play In Doubleheader Over Skidding St. Louis

Picked by most experts to finish last, Bucky Harris' Washington Senators are right in the thick of the battle for the American League lead with Boston and Cleveland, thanks to a quartet of ex-Yankees.

The former New Yorkers sparked in Washington's sweep of a doubleheader from the skidding St. Louis Browns Sunday. The victories boosted the Nats into third place, 3½ games behind the pace-setting Boston Red Sox.

Outfielders Archie Wison and Jackie Jensen, two of the four players acquired by Washington in Saturday's six-man trade with the Yankees, made auspicious debuts, pounding out nine hits between them as the Nats tripped the Browns, 21 and 13-7.

Wilson scored both Washington runs in the first game as ex-Yankee Bob Porterfield edged Tommy Byrne in a pitching duel.

Tom Ferrick, another former Yankee, was credited with the second-game victory, hurling one-hit ball in a seven-inning relief stint. He was aided by a 21-hit attack.

The Yankees were happy about the trade, too, because Irv Noren, whom they obtained in the six-player swap, banged out two vital hits as the New Yorkers took two from the Chicago White Sox, 8-0 and 3-1.

Indians Go Up Notch

Cleveland's Indians climbed into second place by defeating the Boston Red Sox, 9-6, with a five-run blast in the seventh inning.

Eddie Joost hit a pair of homers in the first game and Hank Majeski singled with the bases loaded in the ninth inning of the second to give the Philadelphia Athletics a sweep of the doubleheader with Detroit, 10-6, and 6-5.

New York's Giants clung to their half-game lead over Brooklyn in the National League, vanquishing the Chicago Cubs in a 10-inning battle, 6-3.

Carl Erskine registered his first Major League shutout, pitching the Dodgers to a five-hit, 6-0 win over the Pittsburgh Pirates.

Clutch hitting by First Baseman Ted Klusowski and spectacular relief pitching by Frank Smith helped the Cincinnati Reds capture a pair from the Philadelphia Phillies, 5-4, and 2-1.

Gerry Staley became the first pitcher to win five games as the St. Louis Cardinals divided a doubleheader with the Boston Braves. The big Redbird right hander gained a 4-3 victory in the first game, but home runs by Sam

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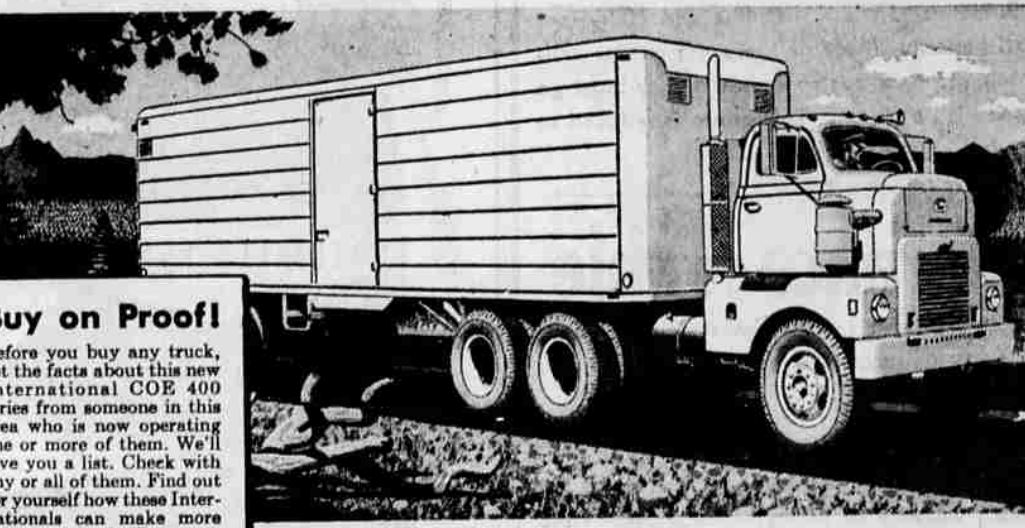
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
