Wage Demands Faced By Oregonian, Journal

PORTLAND — The Portland Newspaper Guild executive committee was authorized Sunday to call a strike against Portland's two major newspapers to back up the Guild's demands for a wage increase and job security.

Results of the voting authorizing strike action against the Oregonian and Oregon Journal were not disclosed.

Larry Howes, president of the Portland local, said an original wage demand of \$125 a week for experienced reporters has been scaled down to come within the increase now allowed by the Wage Stabilization Board. Reporters with five years' experience now are paid \$98.96 a week. The WSB formula would add approximately \$6 to that. Negotiations have been under way since Feb. 15.

The union represents about 200 workers on the editorial staffs of both papers and the Journal's circulation staff.

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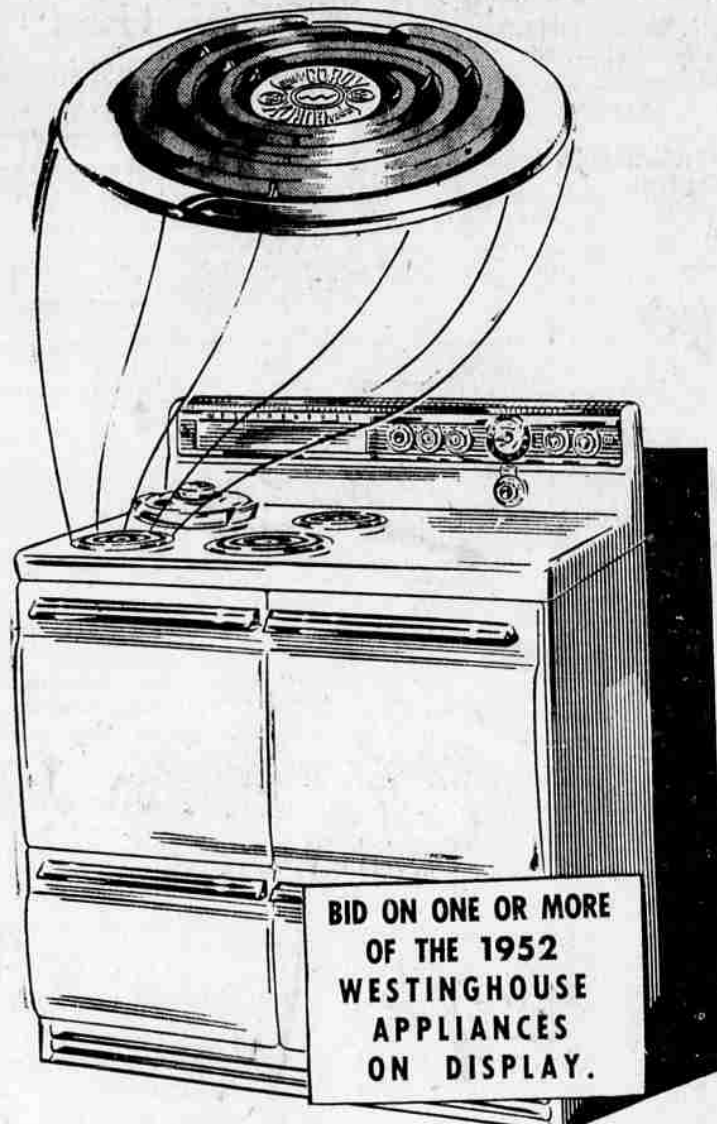
