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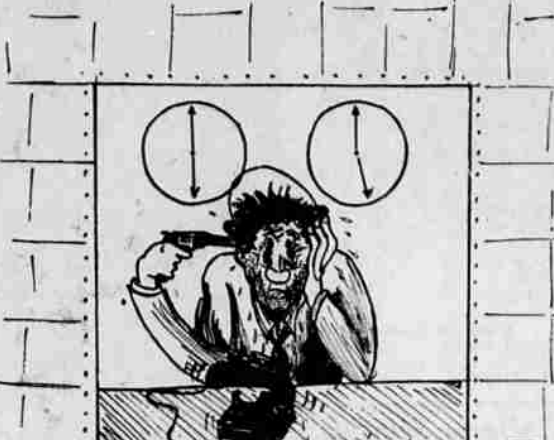

Candidates For Presidency Face Busy Week

One of the busiest weeks of the political year to date gets off to a running start Monday with the Maryland preferential primary.

Maryland voters nominate senators and House members, and elect delegates to state conventions which in turn will name 24 Republican and 18 Democratic delegates to the national conventions.

With write-ins banned, voters have but one chance to cast ballots for a White House aspirant; Democratic Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee is the only presidential hopeful listed.

In a few scattered sections Republicans may ballot on delegates who have openly endorsed Gen. Eisenhower for the GOP presidential nomination.

However, Maryland's 24 Republican delegates—when named—are expected to follow the lead of Gov. Theodore R. McKeldin.

The governor has dropped broad hints he may back Eisenhower, but also has encouraged followers of Sen. Taft of Ohio to believe he may endorse their man.

It will be a busy week politically with Democrats choosing 180 convention delegates and Republicans 78.

The most significant primary contests for the week will take place in Ohio and Florida Tuesday.

Additional delegates will be chosen in Alabama, Indiana, New Mexico, Kentucky, Illinois, Nevada, Utah and Michigan.

By week's end, Taft probably will have pulled ahead of Eisenhower in the delegate race, as he is expected to win handily in his home state.

The Associated Press survey of delegates pledged or willing to express a preference, shows Eisenhower currently four delegates ahead of Taft among those already chosen. Taft claims he is ahead.

Loans To Demos Charged Off Tax, Senator Claims

WASHINGTON (U. S. Sen. Williams (R., Del.), told the Senate Tuesday three wealthy citizens have been permitted to charge off their income taxes 90 per cent of \$410,000 of "loans" made to Democratic committees in the years 1940 through 1948.

Williams named the three as Marshall Field of Chicago, Richard J. Reynolds of Winston-Salem, N. C. and David A. Schulte of New York.

The Delaware senator, whose charges helped spur the Congressional investigation of Internal Revenue scandals, displayed what he said were copies of bureau letters authorizing the three to charge off as non-business debts, the major

share of loans he said totaled \$310,000 from Reynolds, \$50,000 from Field and \$50,000 from Schulte.

Describing these as "contributions," Williams said:

"A summary of these decisions shows that the Democratic party has, through these favorable rulings, been financing a part of their political campaign indirectly out of the federal treasury.

"I am opposed to either political party financing its campaign either directly or indirectly out of the federal treasury.

However, if the Treasury Department is going to allow large contributions to the Democratic party to be classified as loans, and thereby become legitimate income tax deductions, then I shall insist that the same consideration be given to contributors to the Republican party."

Taft Supporters Dispute Claims Of Ike's Backers

The presidential panorama Thursday: Some Republicans disputed the meaning of the Massachusetts vote, some Democrats talked of a "draft" and most nomination-seekers got set for a television show.

Conflicting inferences were drawn from Tuesday's Massachusetts election by supporters of the front-running rivals for Republican nomination—Sen. Taft of Ohio and Gen. Eisenhower.

Non-complete returns show Eisenhower got 69 per cent of the Republican vote in the popularity poll, and 27 of the 28 nominating convention delegate posts at stake.

Thus, with 604 votes needed to nominate, the Associated Press compilation of delegate strength—based on concessions, pledges, instructions and statements—shows: Taft 274, Eisenhower 270. Taft forced a runoff more than 300.

Conflicting Claims
In Washington, Sen. Saltonstall (R., Mass.), an Eisenhower partisan, called the primary a "great groundswell." He said the general would get at least 34 of Massachusetts' total 38 delegates.

A Taft man, Sen. Young of North Dakota, brushed this aside.

Voting in the west and midwest, he said, will tell a different and "more favorable" (to Taft) story.

Taft attributed the outcome to Democrats who voted as "Republicans for one day only." In Paris, Eisenhower's comment was: "overwhelming—it has begun to look sort of serious."

Democratic leaders, meanwhile, talked of a new movement to draft Gov. Stevenson of Illinois for the nomination.

Stevenson Stands Pat
Stevenson, in Oregon Thursday, was still trying to convince the sceptical that he is not a candidate.

Portland reporters asked him if he would accept a draft. He replied: "I don't believe there is any such thing as a draft. I have said I won't be running for president while I'm running for re-election as Governor of Illinois."

In Washington, a move was underway—backed by some party leaders skilled in convention maneuvering—not to take Stevenson at his latest word.

This group was described as being opposed to Sen. Kefauver of Tennessee, tops so far in delegate strength, and at least indifferent to the other avowed aspirants: Sen. Russell of Georgia.
