Talent Variety During Music Week Scheduled

During Music Week, May 4 through May 11, music lovers of Roseburg are joining those all over the nation in activities designed to emphasize the place good music holds in present-day living.

Among programs which encourage participation of younger talent is "Junior Recital Hall," presented by KRXL at 7:00 o'clock, daylight time Wednesday evening. Students of local music teachers will furnish a half hour of piano and violin music which will represent a variety of musical taste.

Another program the same evening is "Fun Fest for the Family" at 8:00 o'clock, daylight time, given in the Junior High School Auditorium. This program will include numbers by the Rose Rhythm band, the singing groups of the Junior and Senior High Schools, solo and group dancing from the Patterman Dance Studio, singing groups from Dillard, organ numbers and the Camp Fire Choral Group.

On Thursday evening the School of Music of the University of Oregon will present Walter Martin, accordionist, and William Woods, pianist. They will be accompanied by the University student string quartette.

The major attraction of Friday will be the presentation of "The New Earth," by Hadley, at the First Christian Church at 8 p.m., daylight time. The choir, under the direction of Clarence Trued, will be assisted by organ, piano and instruments from the Roseburg Symphony orchestra.

The committee from the Douglas County Music Teachers' Association is urging all citizens of Roseburg to participate in this effort to show appreciation of the place music holds in enriching the lives of all people.

Walter Martin Will Be Featured In Concert Here Thursday Night

An important part of the observance of Music Week in Roseburg will be a program of music presented by the School of Music of the University of Oregon, Thursday evening at 8:15, daylight time, in the auditorium of the First Baptist Church.

The featured artist will be Walter Martin in his senior year in the school, studying under Hermann Gelhausen. Martin has appeared in a number of important musical programs, including the University Theatre's production of Von Flotow's "Martha," Menotti's "The Old Maid and the Thief" and other productions. He has been featured soloist with the University Symphony, singing Wotan's "Abshied un Feurer Musik" and Mahler's "Kindertotenlieder."

In January Martin won second place in the Young Artists Auditions in Portland. He will be the featured soloist with the Women's Choral Club concert to be given in Eugene, May 13, and with the Crescendo Club of Portland May 28. Martin plans to enter the field of opera, and will soon leave to study in Europe in that profession.

Acting as his accompanist and as intermission soloist will be William Woods of the piano department of the school of music. Advanced piano students have been studying under Woods in Roseburg this past winter, and it is their appreciation of his piano artistry which has led to this concert here.

Allies' Final Peace Bid Turned Down By Reds

tain a just and honorable cessation of hostilities in order to terminate the terrible toll of suffering, destruction and bloodshed," and to lessen the "risk of spreading the conflagration."

"The responsibility for peace in Korea," he said, "rests on the Communist leaders."

SEOUL, Korea (AP) — Allied war planes ripped up two Red rail lines in 340 places Tuesday and were back blasting them again Wednesday.

Fifth Air Force fighter-bombers opened 104 more gaps in the main line north of Red Korea's capital, Pyongyang, broken in 170 places Tuesday.

Another 170 cuts were reported by pilots from the carriers Valley Forge and Princeton. They worked over an 80 mile segment of the East coast railway, centered on Hamhung.

Planes and warships supported front line troops. A raiding Allied patrol fought for two hours early Wednesday with Chinese west of Chorwon on the Western front.

Other tank - supported raiders destroyed four Red bunkers near Kumhwa on the Central front. Thirteen other bunkers were reported closed by guns of the U. S. cruiser Manchester, supported by the destroyer Evans in round-the-clock bombardment of the eastern end of the battleline.

Mrs. E. C. (Lulu Belle) Adams, 61, well-known resident of Roseburg died at Mercy Hospital Tuesday following a prolonged illness. She was born in Roseburg, April 9, 1891, and was married to Emil C. Adams at Portland on April 21, 1918. She moved to Klamath Falls in 1926, then returned in 1946 to make her home in Roseburg.

Surviving are the widower, Emil C. Adams, Roseburg; a sister, Mrs. James W. Tynan, Roseburg, and three brothers, Clarence L. Gilvin, Portland; Harry E. Gilvin, Roseburg; and Richard W. Gilvin, Eugene.

Private funeral services will be held in the chapel of the Long & Orr Mortuary, Thursday, May 8, at 2:30 p.m., DST, with the Rev. W. A. MacArthur of the First Methodist Church officiating. Following the services here, her body will be taken to Eugene for cremation rites. The family requests omission of flowers.

of five million dollars to do the job and another combine of architect-engineers a half million fixed fee to supervise the project.

Delays Explained
Bonny, speaking for Atlas, said the contractors ran into long delays in landing equipment and men, through a hitch in agreements between French Moroccan and U. S. authorities.

Sites and plans for the bases were changed several times, he said, so that instead of building one new field and reconstructing four old World War II bases, five new bases were finally started.

He said two of them were completed on the deadline and have been in use by heavy bombers. Others are being completed.

"You can build air bases fast, or you can build them cheaply," Bonny said. "But not both."

Bonny stated that French Moroccan suppliers and officials took advantage of the American contractors on materials obtained locally.

He agreed there was some loafing and lack of supervision of workers, but he insisted that the rush job was the biggest and fastest of its kind in history.

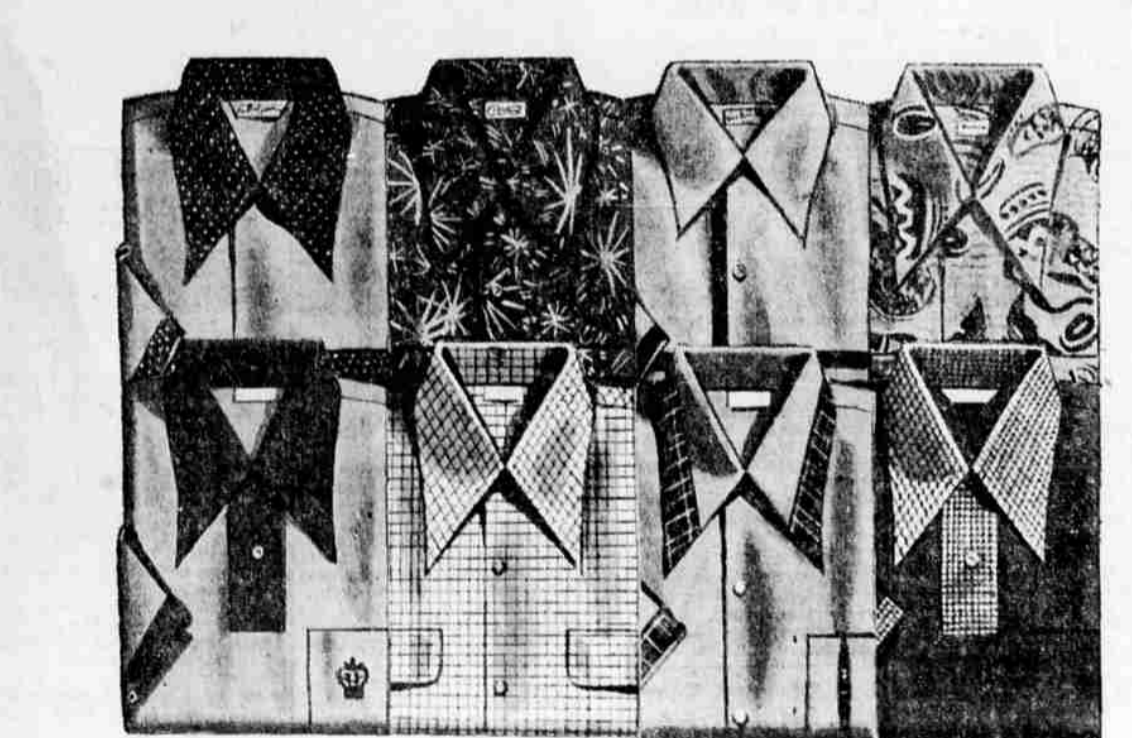
