"TO BE OR NOT TO BE? That is the question," said the matter of whether a town in Oregon will operate on standard time or daylight time has been placed, by the Oregon Supreme Court, in the hands of individual town fathers, and since the majority of the population of the State of Oregon is, or within the next few days will be, operating on daylight time, it appears now that the most feasible solution in the interests of each town is to operate on the Pacific standard time.

Food Inspection Right Reaches Supreme Court
WASHINGTON (AP)—The Supreme Court will rule on whether inspectors of the Federal Food and Drug Administration may enter food manufacturing plants at "reasonable times."
The high tribunal Monday ordered a hearing on a Justice Department appeal from a decision that the inspectors may be barred unless permission to enter has been granted previously.
That decision, by the U. S. Circuit Court in San Francisco, found Ira D. Cardiff had the right to bar inspectors from the plant of the Washington Dehydrated Food Co. in Yakima County, Wash., when they showed up there on March 31, 1950.

Govt. Radio Spy Quits Over Lack Of Manpower
SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—The single official responsible for detecting spy and other illegal radio transmitters throughout Northern California and Nevada quit Wednesday night.
Insufficient manpower and inadequate equipment was the reason given by Frank Roach, supervisor of investigation for the Federal Communications Commission (FCC).
He said engineers in similar posts across the country also are snowed under. He blamed it all on "inadequate appropriations for the FCC."
The result, he said, is that:
1. Lives of airline passengers are endangered. "There is always the possibility of unexplained (airplane) crashes that the cause was directly attributable to radio interference."
2. Armed forces communications are threatened.
3. The way is open to gamblers to transmit race results to bookmakers. "I know there is a ring of gamblers in the East Bay with radio transmitters in their cars. But...how can one man catch them actually transmitting?"
4. It is difficult to detect any cases of subversive transmitters.
"I just don't know," Roach said, "whether there are any spies using radio transmitters...we don't have enough men and proper equipment to find out."

\$20,000 Damages Asked In Collision Of Autos
Suit has been filed in Circuit Court by Charles W. Hubbs against Elmer John Denning for \$20,000 damages in an auto accident six miles south of Roseburg.
Hubbs alleges injuries in a collision April 1, 1951, with a car operated by the defendant. Special damages of \$165 are also asked.
A Circuit Court judgment and decree was issued Sun Studs, Inc., in a foreclosure suit against Joe W. Shafer.

British, U.S. Planes Collide—Who? What?
LONDON — Two surprised fighter pilots, one British and one American, bailed out of their planes at six-mile altitude and drifted into London's southern suburbs with each wondering, "what hit me?"
Their planes collided during joint exercises Monday between the U. S. Air Force and Royal Air Force. After they parachuted, their planes plunged into the ground three miles apart.
The British pilot floated down onto a suburban sidewalk and reported, "someone clipped off my tail."
The American flier, Capt. Milton G. Whitford of the 81st Fighter Wing, dodged chimney pots and landed an arm's length from a backyard hothouse.

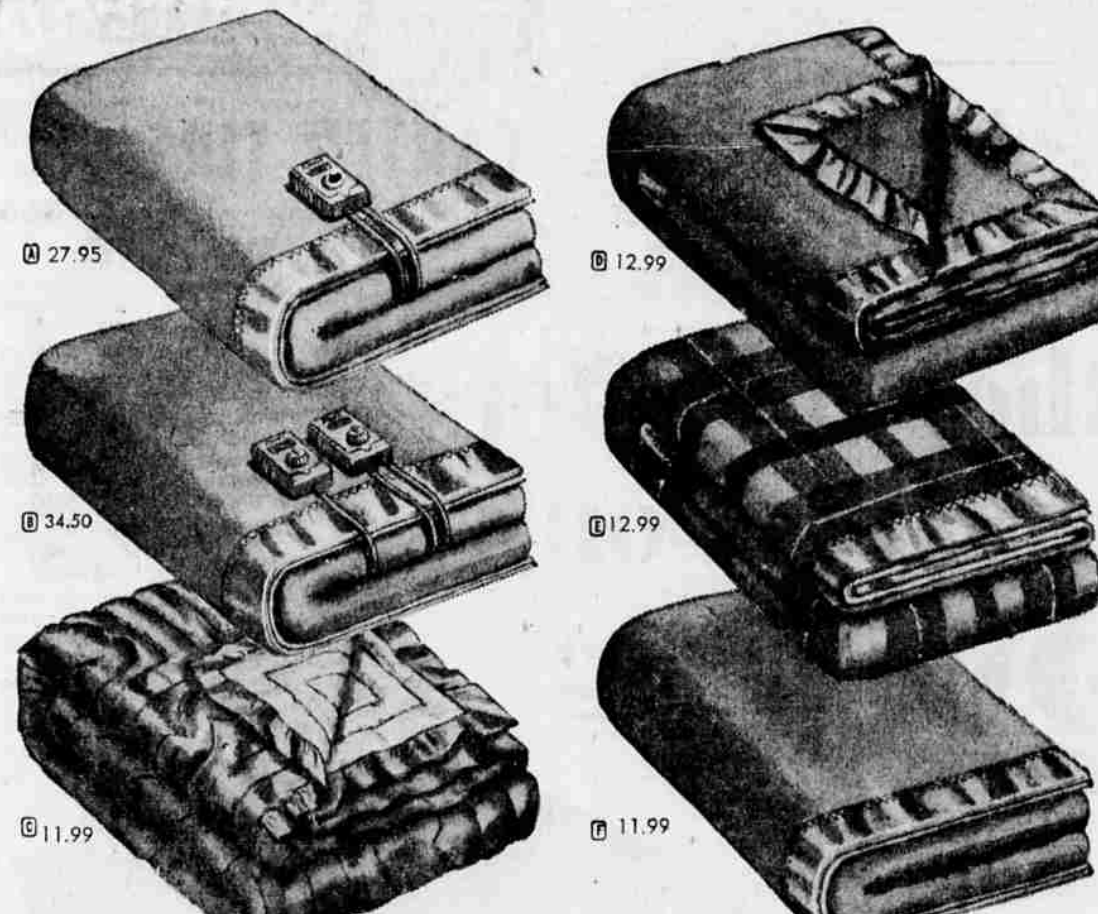
