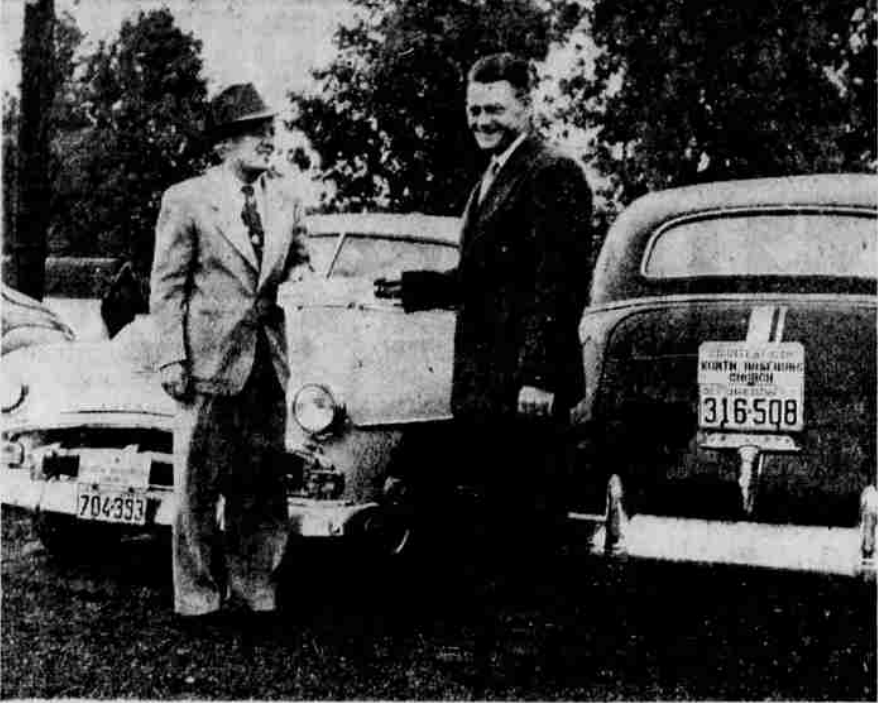
**DRUNKEN DRIVERS RAPPED**
