Lumber Strike Doesn't Affect Sawlogs' Price
CORVALLIS (AP) — The price of demand for Willamette Valley saw logs has been unaffected so far by the strike of lumber industry workers, the weekly farm forest products market report said Wednesday.

The price for Douglas fir logs remained unchanged. Pulpwood was generally light to fair demand. Dry cascara bark prices began a seasonal climb, jumping four cents a pound in Eugene for the week ending Saturday. The price is now 20 cents.

The Roseburg Umpqua Chiefs are set to bow onto the local baseball scene this Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock daylight saving time. The new team will be studied with such imports as Dave Mann, Bob Bonebrake and Barney Koch.

Manager Earl Sargent reports he will undoubtedly start Dave Mann, the ace football sophomore from Oregon State, on the mound. He hopes to use both Mickey Coen and Bus Sporer in relief roles, however.

Admission prices for all games this year have been standardized at \$1 for adults and 50 cents for youths 15 and under. Children 12 and under will be admitted free.

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Second Annual Junior High Track, Field Meet Saturday

With all the pomp of an Olympic Game, the second annual Douglas County Junior High School Track and Field Meet will host approximately 150 seventh and eighth graders this Saturday on Finlay Field.

Three "A" schools and an undetermined number of "B" schools will participate in a total of 48 events. In each of the two divisions, separate races and field events will be staged for the seventh and eighth graders. Each division and grade will run off 12 events as follows: 120-yard hurdles, 75 and 150-yard dashes, 440 and 880 yard runs, 440 yard relay, shotput (eight pound), discus, javelin, pole vault, high jump and broad jump. Five places will be awarded for every event. Two trophies have been donated by the Rotary Club.

The three "A" schools participating are Sutherlin, Myrtle Creek and Roseburg. In the "B" division at least five schools have shown intentions of entering. They are: Camas, Valley, Canyonville, Garden Valley, Drain and Oakland.

Preliminaries in the "B" division dashes and hurdles will start at 10:30. If several more schools enter, the "B" relay preliminaries will also be run off.

As a new twist to the meet, two girls are entered in the events. One is Wanda Loftis, the Canyonville speedster, who is being primed for a shot at the Olympic Games traveling squad. She will run in the 75-yard dash.

Eleven Junior High girls will handle the distribution of individual ribbons from a raised platform on the field in the highest Olympic style.

PORTLAND (AP) — A value of \$405,000 has been placed on timberlands at Gold Beach, Ore., which two Indians sold for \$135,000. The Oregonian said Wednesday.

The newspaper said it had found the estimate had been made by the U. S. Forest Service.

U. S. District Attorney Henry Hess has filed a suit to nullify the sale. After the timberlands were sold by the Indians they were resold to a white man.

The Portland Trust bank also has a suit pending to nullify the sale. The bank is the conservator of the Indian's property.

Fishing License Fee For Disabled Vets Still 50 Cts.

War veterans 25 per cent or more disabled are entitled to Oregon fishing licenses for a special rate of 50 cents, the Department of Veterans' Affairs reported this week.

The veteran must have been an Oregon resident for one year prior to applying for the license, and his disability must be certified by the federal Veterans Administration.

The same 50-cent rate is available to the disabled veteran for a hunting license, or he may obtain a combination hunting-fishing license for one dollar.

Application is made to the State Game commission, 1834 S. W. Alder, Portland. Application blanks are available from county veterans' service officers, county clerks, or the state veterans' department at State Library building, Salem, and State Office building, Portland.

Those who received the special licenses last year need only submit their old licenses in applying for this year's. New applicants must submit a disability statement from the Veterans Administration, and a notarized statement from a witness testifying to Oregon residence.

For men currently on active duty with the Armed Forces, Oregon law now provides that they may purchase Oregon fishing and hunting licenses for the regular resident fees, whether they are Oregon residents or not.

The servicemen may purchase the resident license at any of the 970 license agencies in Oregon, which includes offices of county clerks and most sporting goods stores. He must submit proof that he is on active duty.

Fractured Foot Fails To Stop Roseburg Miller

If heart makes a runner, Ed Stritzke, Roseburg's fine mile, deserves the name.

His high school running career is ended, but he closed it out with all the heart of a thoroughbred. A doctor's report shows the curly-haired mile has a broken bone in his foot and will not be able to run the remainder of the season. The twist to the story is that Stritzke ran his record-breaking mile in the sub-district meet last Friday after the foot was broken.

The youngster first felt the pain Thursday when he apparently broke the bone in his instep during practice. He refused to see a doctor Friday because of the fear of being withdrawn from the meet. He entered the mile and moved to the tape in 4:53, probably the fastest time in his career.

The following day, he was examined by a physician who revealed the broken bone. The doctor immediately wrapped the foot in a cast just in case Stritzke held a secret hope of entering the district meet at Eugene this week-end. Stritzke will travel with the team to Eugene, according to Coach Frank Purdy, but only as a spectator.
