The next meeting will be held at the home of Metta Calkins May 15. A potluck luncheon will be served. All members are asked to be present.



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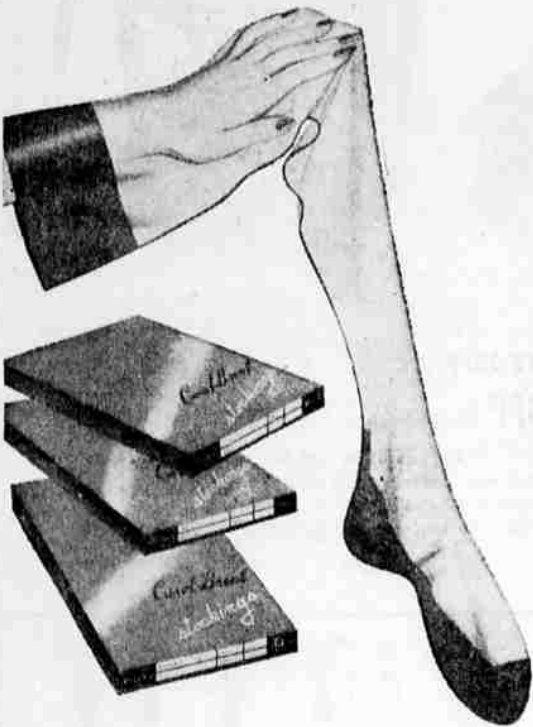
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
