

Alleged Slayer Flees Idaho Jail

BURLEY, Idaho (AP) — Searl Ward, on trial for slaying his mother after her body was found stuffed in the trunk of his car in Arizona, escaped from the Cassia County jail Wednesday night or early Thursday.

A state-wide search was launched for the 25-year-old veteran who was declared insane by a psychiatrist but found sane enough to stand trial by a district court jury.

Sheriff Saul Clark said Ward apparently saved his way through the bars of his third-floor jail cell and dropped down an elevator shaft to the second floor on a rope made of a torn mattress cover.

From there he went to the basement and escaped through a window in the ladies rest room.

Only one other prisoner was in the jail.

Ward is charged with first-degree murder in the fatal shooting of his mother, Mrs. Alice Ward, at their farm home near Almo, Idaho.

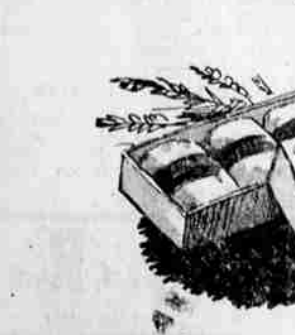

"loyal to their conscience and country." He cited the example of 11 men who were about to be executed by Nazi executioners. They admonished the chaplain not to revenge their death, but rather to strive to build a new Norway on love. Orrn stated this kind of spirit must be emphasized in our own age.

Evangelism Stressed

The third major speaker, Rev. Clifford Hansen of the American Baptist Home Mission Society, stated that the church must give more emphasis to the evangelistic technique. In this respect, he pointed out two basic efforts which must be made: (1) Discover techniques and approaches to people outside the church, and (2) make available facilities for a wholesome church-directed program of recreation for the "groups across the tracks." He went on to say that the Baptist Church is the only major denomination which has program for juvenile protection.

Black Market Reference To Potatoes Erroneous

An item in Thursday's News-Review referring to the sale of seed potatoes as "black market" was in error.

According to C. W. Tidwell, manager of the produce department at the City Drive-In Market, the government designates seed potatoes as such, and they may be sold as seed potatoes under government label. They are not under ceiling prices.

Tidwell said he has obtained a shipment of seed potatoes from a Eugene wholesaler to help carry over the period until new potatoes are on the market.

The Roseburg Rotary Club Thursday noon heard Dr. Harry Dillin, president of Linfield College, discuss the dangers to the American way of life from apathy of the American people.

A feature of the meeting was the awarding to Ormond Feldkamp, a plaque for his work this past year as president of the Roseburg YMCA. The presentation was made by Cecil Sherwood, Feldkamp remarked, "It is an honor to belong to the YMCA, because it stands for service regardless of race, creed or color."

Human Soul Paramount

Dillin, here for the Baptist State Convention and elected head of the state Baptist organization for the coming year, described the human soul as "by far the most powerful force in all the world. It is far more powerful than the atomic bomb or other weapons of destruction."

"You may think you can live smugly in Roseburg," he said, but warned of the dangers of apathy and indifference if we are to successfully guard against communism.

Dr. Dillin recently went to Europe and the near East to make special studies for a book he has just written on Communism.

Don't complain about democracy, if you do nothing about it, he advised. We may change the faces of the men in charge of government, but that will do no good unless we change the pattern of America back to the way it was intended to be.

Parking Meters Still On Standard Time

The City of Roseburg is on daylight time, by decree of the city council, but the city's parking meters must operate on standard time.

This was the decision of City Attorney Paul Geddes, after the issue came up in municipal court and caused considerable confusion.

The city charter reads that the parking meters are to operate between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. Under daylight time, the meters will have to operate between 10 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Motorists who have been accustomed to plugging the meters around 9 o'clock each morning, have an hour of grace under daylight hours, but those accustomed to parking without paying a penalty late are the ones who will have to be on the lookout.

Truck Ditched To Avoid Ramming School Bus

A Beacon freight line semi-tractor and two trailers, failing to stop behind a school bus, went over a 20-foot embankment north of Drain about 4 p.m. Thursday, state police report.

The driver, identified as Merlin Miller, 25, of Beaverton, was not injured.

No bid of less than \$10.05 per M board feet for Douglas-fir, \$15.30 per M board feet for western white pine, sugar pine and ponderosa pine, \$4.05 per M board feet for western redcedar, and \$13.35 per M board feet for Western hemlock, white fir and other species will be considered. In addition to the prices bid for stumpage, a cooperative deposit of \$0.05 per M board feet, to be used by the Forest Service for paying the cost of slash disposal, and a cooperative deposit of \$0.25 per M board feet, to cover the cost of tree planting, seed sowing and timber stand improvement work on the area cut over, for the total cut of timber under the terms of the agreement, will be required.

As a qualification for oral bidding, all bidders must submit a sealed bid accompanied by the required payment to the forest supervisor prior to 2:00 p.m., P.S.T., May 19, 1952. Sealed bids will be posted at the beginning of the auction for the information of all bidders. \$15,000.00 must accompany each bid, to be applied on the purchase price, refunded, or retained in part as liquidated damages, according to the conditions of sale. If an oral bid is declared to be high at the closing of the
