## Al Neet Named Supt. Of Schools At Myrtle Creek

Al M. Neet, elementary principal of Myrtle Creek District 19-C schools, has been elevated to the position of superintendent of schools for that district.

Announcement of the school board's action Thursday night was made by Mahlon C. "Mike" Deller, superintendent, who has resigned, effective July 1, to take a similar position as head of Roseburg's schools.

Neet has served as elementary principal the last three years. A native of Oregon, he was born in Eugene, and was graduated from Lowell High School. He was graduated from Oregon College of Education at Monmouth with a B.S. Degree in 1946. Before coming to Myrtle Creek, he taught three years at Albany. He is now taking graduate work with the University of Oregon.

During the war he served three years in the navy, in radar work. Neet takes over a district with 1300 students and 56 teachers. The schools are in the midst of a building program and the organization of a cafeteria, built last fall, but used this current year for class rooms. It will be available for use as intended with completion of the new grade school at Tri-City.

Deller complimented the Myrtle Creek board upon the selection of Neet, whom he said has been popular with the faculty and is a strong Parent-Teachers Association worker. He is president of the Western Oregon Elementary Principals Association.

Neet's wife, Eleanor, also teaches in the Myrtle Creek Schools.

## Ike Won't Campaign For GOP Nomination

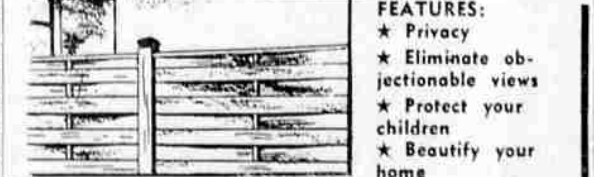
OSLO, Norway (AP)—Gen. Eisenhower said Friday night that if the people like Ike for President "they will know where to find me"—but repeated that he has no intention of campaigning for the Republican nomination.

Oso was Eisenhower's last stop on the Scandinavian leg of his farewell tour as Supreme Allied Commander. His assignment ends June 1 and he plans to return to the United States then to be available if he is nominated by the Republican convention in July.

He said he will resign his general's commission if he is nominated so that he can speak without hindrance.

## YOUR BODY

The thyroid gland consists of two lobes, one on each side of the trachea (windpipe) just below and anterior to the larynx or voice box with a connecting isthmus or channel. It weighs approximately one ounce, and is composed of a large number of tiny closed sacks or vesicles and these are filled with a material commonly called "colloid." It is richly supplied with blood vessels and this colloid material which apparently contains the hormone secreted by the gland is believed to be secreted into the blood stream within the gland.

Any enlargement of the thyroid gland, except of an inflammatory or malignant character, is termed a goiter. Simple goiters are not accompanied by constitutional symptoms. They are said to occur more frequently in certain regions of the earth far from the ocean or shielded from the sea breezes by high mountains. Sea water contains relatively high concentrations of iodine and it is generally stated that the lack of iodine in the drinking water and foods in these regions is associated with the prevalence of this condition.

The hormone secreted by the gland contains iodine. In fact, more than half of the iodine in the body is concentrated in the thyroid. This relationship of iodine to the thyroid has long been known, and iodine has been used in the treatment of simple goiter for over a century. It is more effective in preventing simple goiter than in curing it.

Two functions are attributed to the thyroid gland. It has a profound effect upon the growth and development of the body, and it has a stimulating effect upon the total metabolism.

In young animals, removal of the thyroids, results in an arrest

of growth. In human beings a similar effect is seen when the thyroid is non-functioning at birth. The resulting condition is termed cretinism. Cretins are abnormal dwarfs. They frequently have bowed legs, thick skin, and coarse hair. Although they may grow to adulthood, they do not develop mentally. The sex organs remain small and the abdomen becomes distended. In the adult and clinical condition of hypothyroidism or lack of thyroid secretion is known as myxedema. In these cases the individual changes somewhat in appearance, the skin becomes thick and puffy and there tend to be swellings under the eyes. Although general intelligence is not impaired, the person is slower in thinking as well as in movements. There is a slowed metabolic rate, an increased deposition of fat, with almost all functions usually diminished.

The influence of the thyroid upon the metabolism is more evident in cases of increased function. In this type of glandular disorder the metabolic rate increases considerably above the normal figures, eighty percent above normal is not unusual. Consequently more food is consumed, in spite of which a loss of weight usually occurs. The person often feels hot because of the increased heat production. Some other symptoms are excitement, and irritability. There is also an increase in the pulse rate and an extra load put upon the heart which must compensate for this condition.

The thyroid gland is slightly larger in women than in men. In girls during the puberal period, temporary enlargement is common. This gland also undergoes physiological enlargement at menstrual time and during pregnancy. (Pd. Adv.)
