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Roseburg Church To Hear Workers From North India

Rev. Ovid and Helen Dillingham, missionaries to North India, will be the guest speakers at the Assembly of God Church, 948 W. 1st Street, on May 11 at 6:30 and 7:45 p.m. services. Rev. Vernon L. Klein, local pastor, extends a welcome to all to attend.

The Dillinghams for the past three years have been serving as the managers of the James Harvey Memorial School for boys located at Nawabganj-Gonda, United Provinces, North India. This school has been carried on by the widow of its founder, Mrs. Esther B. Harvey, for 30 years.

The founder succumbed eight years after it was established. The school has developed from a simple primary and middle school to the establishing of an advanced secondary (high) school during the Dillinghams' management. It has a student body of 330 students. The school ministers educationally and evangelistically to both Christian and non-Christian. This is the largest mission station of the Assemblies of God in North India. It has a ground of 23 acres and in addition to the student body, it has a large group of Indian residents comprising staff and workers on the compound. They minister as well in Zenana (women's) work, and have great opportunities for village evangelism as there are 1,000 villages in a radius of two miles about the school's compound.

They have some unique costumes, interesting curios and fine pictures of the school and compound, which will be shown at their services.

Rev. Dillingham served as assistant pastor at the First Assembly of God Church Oakland, and pastored of the Tracy Assembly prior to sailing for India with Mrs. Dillingham and their two children. One daughter was added to the family in India.

Rev. and Mrs. Dillingham serve under the appointment of the Foreign Missions Department of the Assemblies of God, which has a wide spread work in India. Only recently they were assisted in the organization and promulgation of the native-led Assemblies of God in India which has brought together much of the Pentecostal work in that land.

The Assemblies of God is carrying on missionary activities in at least 51 foreign countries.
