Reds Show Hospitality

In the statement Dodd said he had been well treated in Compound 76, where 5,000 ill - hard North Korean Communist soldiers are POWs.

He said the Reds gave him medical attention and "attended to my personal needs."

The general described a preliminary meeting at which the prisoners explained their grievances about "food, clothing, medical supplies" and several alleged "injuries" to the prisoners.

They gave him a chance to reply, then voted on the answer.

He said the meeting was presided over by Col. Lee Bak Koc, "elected leader" of a prisoner association inside the compound.

"It appeared that in all cases (of dispute) Colonel Lee ruled in my favor," said Dodd.

He also said the Communists had planned to release him during a flower decked ceremony on May 11.

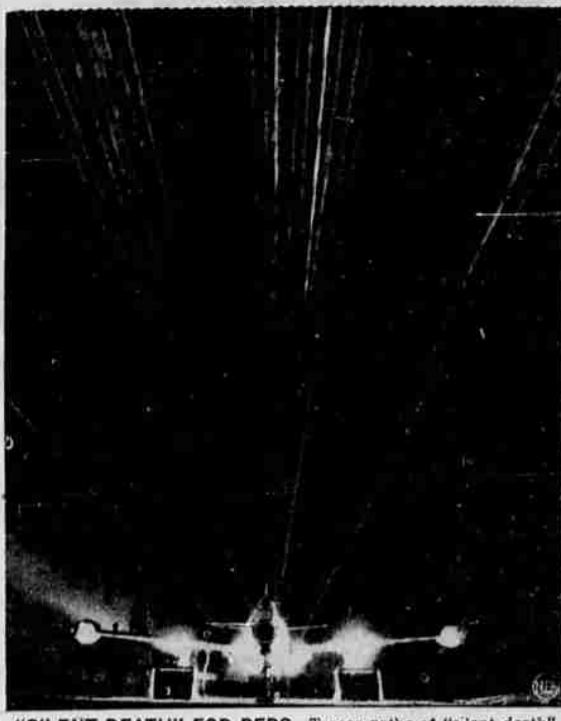
They planned to garland the general with wreaths and march him

Sen. Lodge Criticized

Sen. Henry Cabot Lodge Jr. (R-Mass.), Eisenhower's campaign manager who was in Oregon last week, "apparently has been ill-advised in his attempt to tell the voters of Oregon who the ten delegates at large to the Republican convention shall be," a statement from the backers of U. G. Dubach, a candidate and political science professor, said. The statement was signed by E. C. Sammons, president of the U. S. National Bank of Portland and Dr. Morgan S. The eight candidates who filed by petition are: Robert A. Bennett, Mrs. Irene H. Gerlinger, Lowell C. Paget, John R. Latourette Jr., Phil Metcalf, Irving Rand and Ernest Swigert, all of Portland; and U. S. Balentine, Klamath Falls.
