British Labor Party Posts Big Election Gains

LONDON (AP) — Jubilant labor party leaders declared Friday, on the basis of smashing new gains in week-long town and borough elections throughout the nation, that a second notice to quit had been served on Prime Minister Churchill's Conservative government.

The more important municipal borough elections were held Thursday. Final results from all 391 boroughs gave Laborites this landslide lead in the contest for vacant council seats:

Labor: Gained 657 seats, lost 15 — net gain, 641.

Conservatives: Gained 52, lost 472 — net loss, 420.

Independents: Gained 24, lost 211 — net loss 187.

Liberals: Gained 12, lost 28 — net loss 17.

Communists: Failed to win a single seat.

The best indication of the trend was seen in the fact that in the balloting since Tuesday labor has elected 1,589 of its 2,627 candidates for a victory percentage of 63.9.

Conservatives have elected only 905 of their 2,063 candidates, or 43.9 per cent.

Oratorio Offers Brilliant Note To Music Week

Climaxing a brilliant program in local celebration of Music Week, the Roseburg Symphony Orchestra and an augmented choir from the First Christian Church presented "The New Earth" dramatic oratorio before a capacity audience at the church auditorium Friday night.

Written by Henry Hadley, famed symphony orchestra conductor and composer, "The New Earth," with word poem by Louise Ayers Gannett, is an ode to freedom, depicting the futility of war, the struggle for enlightenment, and honor for those who wage the battle for peace.

The local program presented a 42-voice choir and a 15-piece symphony orchestra under the baton of S. Clarence Trued, choir director.

The audience was thrilled by the masterful blending of instruments and voices, not as solo and accompaniment, but as equal and unified supplicants in the total prayer for peace. Particularly impressive were solo numbers by Patricia Powell, soprano; Hallie Woodward, mezzo soprano; Ralph Church, tenor; and R. Cloyd Riffe, baritone.

The oratorio was preceded by two selections by the orchestra; sonata for organ and strings, by the string orchestra and Ruth Trued at the pipe organ; Grechanoff's "Cherubim Hymn," by the choir; violin numbers by Martha Mulkey, accompanied at the piano by Martha Jane Plimpton; vocal solo by Patricia Powell; and a trio, featuring Wendell Johnson, violin; Robert Davee, viola, and Martha Jane Plimpton, piano.

Announcement was made that the combined orchestra and choir program is to be made an annual event, if desired by music lovers.

The audience Friday night demonstrated its approval of the plan.

Truman Impeachment Resolution Shelved

WASHINGTON (AP) — A resolution for impeachment of President Truman apparently was sidetracked indefinitely in the House Judiciary Committee Tuesday.

Chairman Celler (D-N. Y.) took no action on this resolution, by Rep. Shafer (R-Mich.), in sending to a subcommittee a number of other resolutions prompted by Truman's seizure of the steel industry.

Presumably, the Shafer resolution will be allowed to stay in a committee pigeonhole.

Air Force Chief Warns Of Russia Future Power

WASHINGTON (AP) — Air Force Gen. Hoyt S. Vandenberg told senators Wednesday that within two years Soviet Russia "will possess the means of launching against this country a long-range atomic attack."

"Unless effectively opposed and countered, this attack could neutralize our own ability to retaliate and at the same time could seriously cripple certain key centers of the industrial productivity upon which we depend for ultimate victory in war," the general said.

The Air Force commander joined other Pentagon top brass and civilian secretaries in protesting house-approved slashes in defense spending during the next fiscal year, starting July 1.

The House voted to limit actual military spending in the next fiscal year to not more than 46 billion dollars, some six billions under present plans.

Most of this would apply to the billions Congress has voted for defense in the past two or three years. It also ordered a 4 1/2 billion dollar slash in new funds asked.

Vandenberg's prepared testimony, to be delivered behind closed doors of a Senate Appropriations subcommittee considering a new money bill for the Defense Department, was handed to reporters in advance.

Facing Surgery — Because the Air Force chief was entering Doctors Hospital for surgery, his vice chief of staff, Gen. Nathan F. Twining, arranged to read his statement to the subcommittee.

The nature of Vandenberg's ailment was not disclosed but officers said the operation would be exploratory to determine the source of severe pain.

Federal Price Rules Present Maze Of Detail

WASHINGTON (AP) — If your butcher's turned into a bookworm and your grocer's engrossed in a graph, a couple of food dealers hinted Friday that the government's price control regulations may be responsible.

John J. Dratt of the National Association of Retail Grocers told the House Banking Committee he has grave doubts about the practicality of making 9,900 words on frozen fruits and berries required reading for a busy store manager.

Charles W. Bauer, president of the National Association of Retail Meat and Food Dealers, testified it would take a veterinarian or at least a college graduate to plot his course through the Office of Price Stabilization directions on cutting and trimming a loin of beef.

The official instructions refer among other things to "a flat plane parallel with the flat surface supporting the full loin" and to "an imaginary line parallel with the full length of the protruding edge of the lumbar section of the chine bone." That's what it says.

Dratt brought with him two fat volumes which he said contained the official reading matter with which the government thought retail grocers should be acquainted.

Labyrinth Of Details

The list, he said, includes 45 regulations plus 165 amendments and supplements, totaling approximately 560,700 words. He said a typical one of 5,000 words was entitled "adjustment of ceiling prices on pork loins weighing 16 pounds or less" and prescribes nine steps to be taken weekly in computing ceiling prices. Similar procedures apply in the case of veal, lamb and mutton.

"Gentlemen of the committee," Dratt said, "this presents an absolutely impossible task for the average retail grocer. Selling merchandise is only a small part of the overall operation."
