Truman Backs Peace Package Spurned By Reds

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Truman said Wednesday the United States will not buy an armistice in Korea "by turning over human beings for slaughter or slavery."

The president backed up in a statement the stand by United Nations truce negotiators against forced return of prisoners of war to the Reds.

Truman's words capped earlier statements from other U. S. officials that the U. N. package proposal for an armistice is "final" and in their view "fair."

The package proposes to let the Reds build and repair North Korea air fields but opposes Russia as a "neutral" nation to help police a truce, and rejects the Red insistence that each side should return all prisoners of war.

The U. N. stand is that it should only return those who want to go back to the Communists.

Only 70,000 of 170,000 prisoners of war and civilians have said they would like to return.

Truman said in his statement: "The three parts of Gen. Ridgway's proposal are all parts of a whole. They must be considered as an entity — not piecemeal. Our agreement is contingent upon acceptance of the whole proposal."

This is our position.

"The Communists thus far have indicated only a willingness to withdraw their proposal that the USSR be a member of the neutral inspection commission. This spurious issue was raised by them late in negotiations and its withdrawal no real concession on their part."

The president went on to say the United States approves and supports "without qualification" the proposal Ridgway has offered.

He added:

"To agree to forced repatriation would be unthinkable. It would be repugnant to the fundamental moral and humanitarian principles which underlie our action in Korea."

"To return these prisoners of war in our hands by force would result in misery and bloodshed to the eternal dishonor of the United States and of the United Nations."

"We will not buy an armistice by turning over human beings for slaughter or slavery."

Truman's statement was part of what was obviously a planned U. S. effort to emphasize to the Communists and to the world that the package plan is as far as it will go in concessions.

Acquatic School Set By YMCA

The annual Pacific Northwest Area YMCA aquatic school will be held May 22, 23, and 24 at Blue Lake and at Portland YMCA for the purpose of qualifying YMCA leader examiners, instructors and directors.

All those who have completed their senior lifesaving and are familiar with the YMCA progressive aquatic testing program are urged to attend, said Merlin Donaldson, local YMCA secretary.

The aquatic school is open to men and women. The total registration fee is \$2.50, which will cover certification, emblems and materials. The only additional cost will be for lodging and meals. This will be furnished by the Portland YMCA at a minimum cost.

Outline of the YMCA aquatic school course will include: use of small craft, teaching techniques and class organization; practical water tests; lifesaving instructions; artificial respiration, life saving equipment and its use, water carnivals, meets and pageantry; the national YMCA aquatic program, and organization and administration of the YMCA aquatic department.

Under artificial respiration, the newest preferred method—the Holgate-Nelson, back-pressure, arm lift—will supplant the Schafer method as rapidly as examiners and directors can be instructed, it is announced.

Angell Expects Renomination Easily As Usual

SALEM (AP) — Homer D. Angell, who first went to Congress in 1939 and who is dean of Oregon's six-man delegation in Congress, expects to have much trouble winning renomination and reelection.

He is a Republican. Two Republicans and two Democrats are after his job. He doesn't expect any trouble winning renomination at the primary election Friday.

Angell is a Portlander, as are all of his opponents. His district is Multnomah County, where there is a Democratic majority in registration, but which has sent a Republican to Congress since 1939.

Angell's best-known opponent is A. W. Lafferty, who served in Congress from 1913 to 1915. Lafferty's main campaign plank is to try to get the federal government to turn over the Oregon and California grant lands to the state of Oregon. These lands, however, are located mostly in Southern Oregon, so the subject hasn't become a hot one in Multnomah County.

Angell, like all of Oregon's Republican candidates for Congress, pledges himself to do what he can to reduce taxes and cut government spending. He has many unkind words to say about how the

federal government is "saturated with corruption, graft, collusion, influence peddling, tax fixers and thieves."

The third Republican in the race is a young newcomer to politics. He is John F. Reichlein, 28, a lumber wholesaler and an army air force veteran. His platform is similar to Angell's.

Stallard Again Trying

On the Democratic side, the two contenders are Alfred H. Corbett, lawyer, and H. H. Stallard, who wants the government to pay \$100 a month to every adult in need.

Corbett began serving a year ago as assistant general counsel of the Defense Electric Power Administration, and has been on the Portland Housing Authority. He is new in the political arena.

Stallard was badly beaten when he made his first try for Congress two years ago. He is the father of the Stallard Cooperative Community Center Plan, which he says would cost the government 100 billion dollars a year, and would solve the question of living from cradle to the grave.

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
