

Hunters Get 2,610 Deer Over County

Douglas County showed a success ratio of 35.7 per cent among deer hunters during the 1951 general season, according to figures released by the Oregon State Game Commission this week.

A total of 7,304 hunters ranged out into the county's hinterlands to kill 2,610 deer. This was 4.6 per cent of the deer killed in the state. The state average of successful hunters was 35.1 per cent. Creation of vast new deer ranges in Douglas as well as Coos, Linn

and Linn Counties through extensive logging is reflected in an increased kill over 1950.

However, heaviest hunting was seen in Deschutes, Grant, Klamath and Lake Counties, which also produced the most deer.

Only 433 Elk hunters drew their tags in the Douglas County region. They brought down 56 bulls. Only Coos, Clatsop and Tillamook Counties showed higher bags. Best total was seen in Coos county where 215 bulls were slain.

Doerr needs little advance publicity. He has been playing in the American League for some years. Last year, he batted .289 for the Boston Red Sox, collecting 116 hits in 402 times at bat. San Diego was still out in front in the Pacific Coast League Thursday but the Padres' lead was cut to 2½ games by Wednesday night's 5-1 loss to Los Angeles.

Oakland stayed on the Padres' heels by whipping Sacramento 8-4 while San Francisco shut out Seattle 5-0 and Portland nipped Hollywood 7-6.

San Diego pitcher Grumpy Guy Fletcher fell victim to heavy hitting Max West, who knocked a homer with one aboard and also slammed a double that scored two runs.

At San Francisco "tough luck" Chuckie Elmer Singleton, whose teammates had scored only three runs in his last 46 innings, finally got some support as the Seals batted him to victory over Seattle. Singleton struck out seven and allowed only five scattered hits. San Francisco scored three runs in the fourth on three hits and a Seattle error.

Portland came from behind with four runs in the eighth inning to stop Hollywood. Eddie Barr's bases-loaded single accounted for two. Then Aaron Robinson came home on Don Eggett's out and Eric Tipton singled to score Barr. The Stars' Gepe Handley knocked in two runs with a double in the seventh.

Hal Gregg, the PCL's top fliker, remained undefeated as he pitched Oakland to victory over Sacramento. He fanned eight and allowed eight hits in gaining his seventh win of the season. Acorns helped him along with their biggest inning of the year—six runs in the seventh.

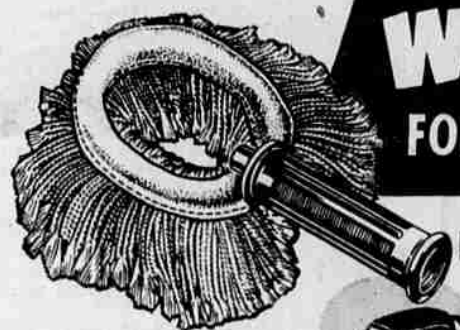
