Emergency Punchboard Order Upheld

SALEM (AP) — The Oregon Supreme Court ruled Wednesday that Portland's anti-punchboard ordinance should go into effect immediately.

In an oral order announced from the bench, the high court reversed a three-judge Multnomah Circuit Court order that had held the Portland City Council had no right to attach the emergency clause to the ordinance, which makes all punchboards illegal.

The City Council added the emergency clause so the ordinance could go into effect immediately. Al Greenberg brought suit

against the City Council, contending the emergency clause made it impossible to attack the ordinance written order later in the day.

Emergency Body Okays \$601,000 For State Needs

SALEM (AP) — The State Emergency Board Monday recommended rejection of a \$150,000 request for food at the state prison, but the turn-down is not a final action. Prison officials explained they had overspent their budget to provide convicts with a heavier meat diet. Originally, they said, they were spending 22 cents a day per convict for food. The addition of more meat to the diet has been the major factor in meals costing 42 cents a day now, they said.

Although the board rejected the request for additional funds, it is expected that Gov. Douglas McKay, who has final say in the matter, will authorize the \$150,000. The board also voted to delay action on a request for \$85,000 to build a license plate factory at the prison. Secretary of State Earl T. Newberry is studying the matter and the board wants to wait for his opinion before recommending expenditure of funds.

New Fairview Building

Largest item recommended Monday was \$420,000 for a new building at the State Fairview Home for feeble-minded. The new building will house 350 children. The board was told that the home now has a waiting list of 270, nearly all of whom are feeble minded children less than three years old. The board recommended allocation of \$50,000 to provide immediate care for 100 of these children. The emergency board voted to

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meet June 13 to consider a proposed 4.7 per cent salary increase for state employees.

Other Funds Approved

Other items approved by the board: To the State Extension Service for mint disease control, \$340; to the state police for automobiles, \$52,564; to the prison for cost increases, \$33,000; to improvements for capital grounds, \$10,000; and

for grasshopper control in Eastern Oregon, \$5,000.

Total of expenditures recommended was \$601,404. That would leave the governor's emergency \$1,500,000 fund at \$679,911.

Budget increases totaling \$1,375,310 were approved for various departments that are self-supporting. These funds will come from license fees and taxes and will not affect the emergency fund.

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
