City Council Defended In Daylight Saving Time

ROSEBURG—It seems human to criticize rather than praise, but I would like to be at least one to defend the action of the city council in switching to daylight saving time for Roseburg.
For anyone who works on an 8 to 5 schedule day after day, it is pleasant during the summer months to have an extra hour of daylight in the evening to work in the yard or go on picnics, etc. It is true that this advantage applies to people in the city, but I can't really see why people in the country, housewives, and others who are not limited to any such schedule should be bothered or inconvenienced. After I've been up a number of hours I'm ready to go to bed and as long as I get three reasonably spaced meals and approximately eight hours sleep, the position of the sun in the sky or the hands on the clock are of very little importance.
There have been many arguments voiced against the time change—none of them really seem too practical. One conversation I heard dealt with the terrible effect on the children, but children are far more flexible than adults and the fuss the parents have been making about the situation has probably had a much greater effect than an hour's change in time could ever have. Another letter dealt at great length with the fact that children born between 12 and 1 A.M. are given the wrong birthday. I understand that if the doctor hadn't stopped for a cup of coffee I would have been born before midnight and consequently had a different birthday too—this hasn't profoundly affected me. Many letters say: "Leave God's Time alone" or "Leave things as they are." Fortunately, all men have not been so torpid to change or we'd still be in the Stone Age. As for the reference to standard time as God's time, I imagine He would wish no credit for our simple conception of time. True, God created the universe to operate according to a precise plan, but our time system and our calendar were evolved by men. Even now scientists could use up with better systems which would be less cumbersome mathematically and which would conform more exactly to the laws of nature, but can you imagine the chaos it would cause among people who are so limited in their ability to make adjustments if someone were to propose a new system with all months having an equal number of days or with an hour defined as anything other than sixty minutes.
Whether or not the city council was correct in reversing the governor's order is debatable; but if his decision had been for D.S.T., the same people who are now upholding his authority would be beating him. In view of the action taken by other cities up and down the coast, the council did what they thought best for the city of Roseburg. I doubt if they realized what an upsetting effect this would have on so many lives.

Sees No Sense In Change To Daylight Saving
