Elkton School Gets Letters From So. Korea

"All we Korean children study hard under great difficulties to get victory against the Communists."

So said Im Choon Bai, of Won-zu Primary School, South Korea, in a recent letter to the Junior Red Cross chapter at Elkton Grade School.

The letter is one of two received recently in response to letters and gift boxes sent to Korea by Elkton students. Miss Ruth Swinney is director of the Junior Red Cross unit.

One writer was impressed with the "thousands of soldiers overflowing along the street and numberless planes in the blue sky. It is a great, magnificent scene."

Both writers expressed thanks for the Red Cross gifts. Chi Yon Whang, sixth year student at another school, said, "It was really an unexpected joy for us all. We cannot help being anxious for repaying your kindness."

"You Americans had already sent many things, such as tanks, airplanes, artilleries and the precious lives of your young men for the purpose of saving us. In addition to that you send such wonderful gifts this time."

Im Choon Bai's letter, dated Jan. 31, 1952, follows. Both letters were translated in Korea.

"How are your health and your school life and all of your USA children."

"We could hear your news through radio and newspapers before June 25, 1950, but we couldn't after our taking refugee from North Korean puppet's invasion."

"Though we have returned to our long home, we found it burnt up and clothes lost away."

"We are learning under the blue sky for the roof, by the trees for pile, on the green grass for a cushion, with singing birds."

"All we Korean children study hard under great difficulties to get victory against the Communists."

"We are thankful of your kind letter and your gift boxes. It will aid our mutual intimacy between USA children and our Korean children."

"It is now just the time of harvest. . . ."

"We are studying hard, waiting the day of early victory."

"I am hoping you are trying as hard as we."

Adenauer Given Nod To Join Defense Plan

BONN, Germany. (AP) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer triumphed over his Socialist opposition in the court Friday and won approval to go ahead next week with the signing of treaties to rearm West Germany and ally it with the West.

Adenauer's legal victory came in the Federal Constitutional Court at Karlsruhe, which rejected a Socialist petition that the chancellor be forbidden to sign the peace contract and its companion European Army treaty to raise 400,000 German troops for Western defense.

Both the Allied forces stationed in Germany and the Bonn government are claiming a lion's share of the 2 1/2 billion dollar new German defense budget. The German rearmament will cost them between 3 1/2 billion and 4 1/2 billion dollars in the first year, want to cut their money contributions to the Western forces to the bone.

Foamite Chief Factor In Oil Fire Control

CORPUS CHRISTI, Tex. (AP) — A million-dollar oil fire which had burned all night in this coastal city was extinguished shortly after dawn Saturday.

Foamite — a carbon dioxide extinguisher which "suffocates" fire by depriving it of oxygen — did the trick. Two hundred thousand pounds of foamite in five-gallon cans arrived from Houston early Saturday.

The fire-dousing substance was quickly applied to what was left of a blaze already near the point of burning itself out.

WCTU Reslates Diamond Medal Speech Contest

The WCTU-sponsored Diamond Medal Speech contest, which was postponed Tuesday due to illness of one of its five participants, has been rescheduled for 8:30 p.m. Sunday, May 25, at the First Christian Church, Douglas and Kane Streets. It will be held in connection with the church's Christian Endeavor meeting, according to Contest Chairman Mrs. Fred Southwick.

Although Martha Thomas became ill and could not attend, the Tuesday program at the Church of the Open Bible was held. The four other student speakers delivered their temperance talks and Mrs. Barbara Draper, Congressional candidate from the Fourth District, spoke.

On May 25 all five contestants will deliver their messages for judging. The winner of the Roseburg contest will be eligible to compete in the state finals at Corvallis in October. The national finals will also be held at St. Louis in September.

The five Roseburg finalists are Edward Hall, speaking on "Bars"; Barbara Marsh, on "Three Steps Forward"; Beverly Nickell, on "A Party for Anita"; Kenneth Reeder, on "Crossing the Gorge"; and Martha Thomas, on "In the Death Cell." Calcium is needed by all cells. Normally the concentration of blood calcium is approximately 10 to 11 milligrams per 100 cubic centimeters of blood.

A particular and important effect of calcium is upon the nervous tissue. If the blood calcium falls, the nervous system becomes highly irritable and often results in muscle cramps. On the other hand, a high calcium content depresses nervous irritability. Therefore the proper calcium administration is indicated in these conditions.

Calcium is, of course, required for bone and tooth formation. If the diet is deficient in this element, either or both may suffer. This is also true if the absorption of calcium is inefficient even in the presence of an adequate amount in the diet. Growing children particularly require an abundance of calcium for these as well as for all other tissues. During pregnancy and lactation there is likewise a great demand for calcium in the diet to provide for the growing fetus and for the secretion of calcium-rich milk. The presence of calcium in proper proportions is also necessary for blood clotting.

There is of course much of the calcium ingested in our daily diet that is of an unabsorbable nature, there is also the factor of need of other substances such as Vitamin D and Phosphorus to render calcium absorbable to the tissues. The acid-alkaline balance also is a factor in calcium absorption. Therefore there is much to be considered in the search for improper calcium balance.

The excretion of calcium is partly through the kidneys but mostly by the bowels. This excretion continues even when the intake is low, and accordingly a negative balance is possible. The intestinal elimination of calcium may be increased by a lack of vitamin D and diminished by a suitable amount in the diet. Therefore since calcium levels have a definite effect upon nervous irritability, it can be appreciated that a low blood calcium if continued long enough, would cause nervous irritability and muscular cramping, together with many other chronic ailments.

Approximately 99 percent of the body calcium is present in the bones. This is in equilibrium with the blood calcium which is kept at a fairly constant level. The bone calcium and blood calcium shift back and forth as necessary to maintain this constancy. Thus the bones are continually being resorbed and rebuilt. The amount of calcium which can be absorbed from the intestine is, of course, of tremendous importance in preventing the drain on the storage of bone calcium from producing a negative balance.

Recently some of our biochemists state that contrary to the common opinion, that calcium is resorbed from the teeth, they claim this is not true. The adult tooth, already fully formed and calcified, is not readily subject to decalcification when the body requires calcium. This is true in pregnancy and lactation as well, and the old saying, "A tooth for every child" has no scientific justification. Disturbances of calcification are only of importance in the growing tooth. Therefore, children must have an abundance of calcium with vitamin D or sunshine to help them absorb it, for tooth as well as for bone development. (Paid Advertisement)
