Miss Tracy was born on her grandfather's donation land claim near Drain, Ore. She was graduated from the old Drain Normal School and she did her first teaching as assistant to A. L. Briggs, the president of the school.

Some of the Roseburg members of the same graduation class include: Judge Carl E. Wimberly, Attorney and Mrs. R. L. Whipple and Attorney General of Oregon, George Neuner Sr.

Miss Tracy began teaching in the Roseburg District No. 4 in the old Riverside School in 1912. The site is now occupied by a modern building erected in the last six years.

Five years later, Miss Tracy left the Old Riverside School to teach at Rose School and several years later became principal of Benson School. She held that position for some 17 years. She then

went to the Junior High School where she has taught seventh grade core subjects for the last five years.

Over this long period, Miss Tracy has been both friend and teacher to scores of young men and women and it is in recognition of this long and tireless service that the PTA groups of Roseburg will sponsor the tea at the clubhouse Tuesday evening.
