

Student Workers, Graduates Urged To Get SS Cards

June graduates of high schools, vocational schools and colleges should apply for their social security account-number cards before they graduate. This is the warning of Claude E. Dawson, Eugene manager of the Social Security Administration of the Federal Security Agency. A representative of the Eugene office will be at the City Hall Tuesday, May 20, between 8:30 a.m. and noon for the convenience of Roseburg area residents.

Also, students who are not graduating but who expect to work

during their summer vacations should obtain their cards before classes end, Dawson said. "The importance of the account number lies in the fact that wages can only be credited through the use of the account number. Since the money recorded in a person's social security account is used to figure benefits, the more money credited in the account the higher the benefits."

"Thus, he explained, 'if for any reason wages are reported without an account number or with an incorrect number, then these wages may not be credited to the account. Not only may future benefits be smaller because of this, but in some cases no benefits may be payable at all.'"

He urged cardholders to protect the card, keep it on their persons at all times show it to employers when necessary and to contact the Eugene Social Security office if in need of assistance.


