Building Material Controls Are Eased

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government eased its building controls Thursday and was reported about ready to drop its price control over liquor and raw cotton.

The various actions included: The National Production Authority ruled that, as of mid-year, structural steel and aluminum may be used in new houses. It also relaxed restrictions on materials for building shops, stores and office buildings.

Beginning July 1, it said, it will relax its ban on the building of amusement and recreation places.

Controls over four metals—lead, antimony, cadmium and bismuth—were removed outright by NPA. It dropped allocation and limitation controls over the use of zinc.

Mobilization Theme Of Talk By Robt. Kidder

Mobilization of our national economy is of vital importance to our national defense. That was the principal theme of a two-week school attended by Robert Kidder, chief of special services at the Roseburg Veterans Hospital, in Portland recently.

Kidder discussed briefly the courses at the Rotary Club meeting Thursday noon in the Hotel Umpqua. The school he attended was but a summary of a similar 10-month course on Economic Mobilization taught in War College and Industrial College at Ft. Leslie J. McNair each year for officers of the armed service and a few civilian personnel, who are in key positions if an emergency should arise. The short courses are conducted in the larger cities for key personnel of the respective areas.

Among outstanding topics were strategic materials, listing the probable supply of such vital minerals as coal, iron, phosphorus, bauxite, zinc, lead and others.

The course of action in preservation of these materials include conservation, substitution, such as the use of plastics; research and development into new fields, and development of adequate stockpiles through imports.

The strategic position of the Middle East was also stressed by the speaker. Its importance lies first, in its strategic position, lying between Russia and Africa, and the vital Suez canal; second, its oil supply; and third, its economic, political and military weakness.

He discussed the population, food and natural resources of these countries and some of their major problems.

The strategic importance of Canada and its undeveloped resources was also an important factor discussed.

Tribute was paid to Jack Sinner, who passed away this week. He became a member in 1922.
