receipts, \$1,215,000; Forest Service timber sale receipts, \$275,000; motor vehicle license fees, \$275,000. The remainder comes from miscellaneous sources.

The general county fund is \$1,222,300, of which \$173,000 has been budgeted for the county school fund on the basis of \$10 per census child. A total of \$1,700 is allocated for the school library fund.

Estimated income to the general county fund is \$838,000 and major sources of revenue are: interest on county land and timber sales contracts \$250,000; county clerk's office, \$40,000; justice courts, \$30,000; state welfare commission refunds, \$75,000; alcohol taxes, \$25,000.

Flegel Thus Far Third In Demos' Delegate Race

Roseburg's mayor, Albert G. Flegel, reports he plans to attend the Democratic National Nominating Convention in Chicago, regardless of whether he wins a delegate position. Latest available returns place him a close third in the race for district delegate where two are to be elected. It is expected he would gain an alternate position as a result of this showing should he fail to overcome the lead of Dave Epps, holding second place in the unofficial tally of 326 precincts from 483 in the district.

Walter H. Dodd holds No. 1 spot with 9,365 votes, Dave Epps second, 7,505, and Flegel third, 7,317. Other standings are Lee M. Chance 4,496, Sidney Leiken 4,076, John O. Chatt, 3,900, James M. McGinty 2,914, Charles R. Zuluf 2,680.

Commissioner Metzger is representing Douglas, Coos, Curry, Jackson and Josephine counties.


Modern Architecture Theme At Art Meeting

Meters On Daylight Time

In other action, the council put parking meters back on a 9 a. m. to 6 p. m. basis, daylight saving time, effective today. The council passed an ordinance amendment allowing such changes, and then set the times at 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. standard time — which brings it to 9 to 6 daylight time.

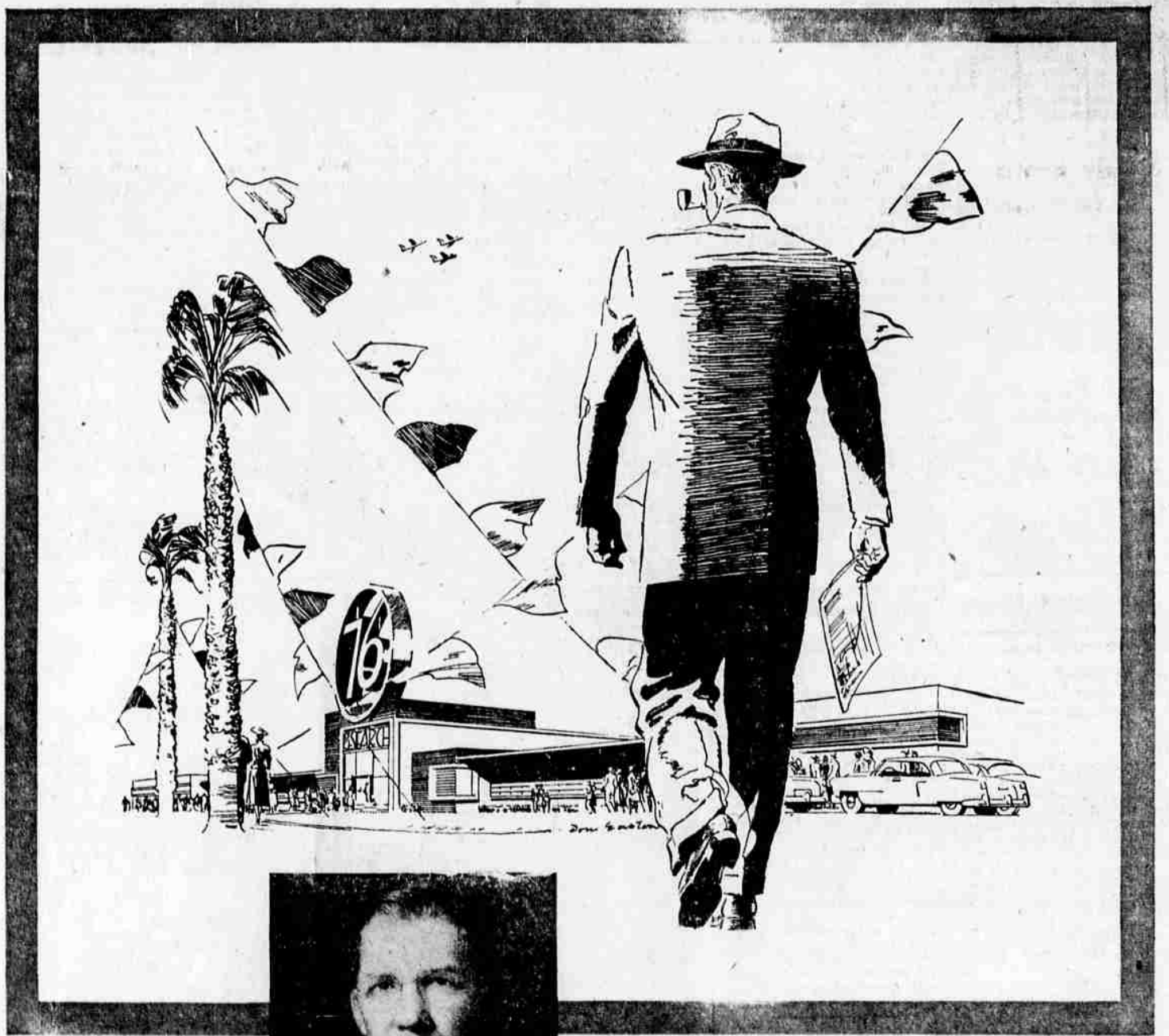
