J. W. La Cells was working on the unfinished dam Thursday when some equipment knocked him off. Doctors said he suffered a broken shoulder blade and two broken ribs.

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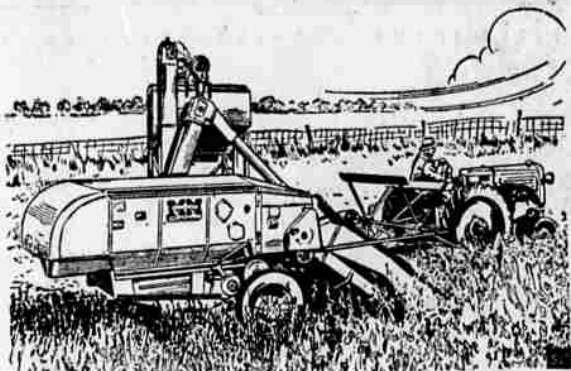
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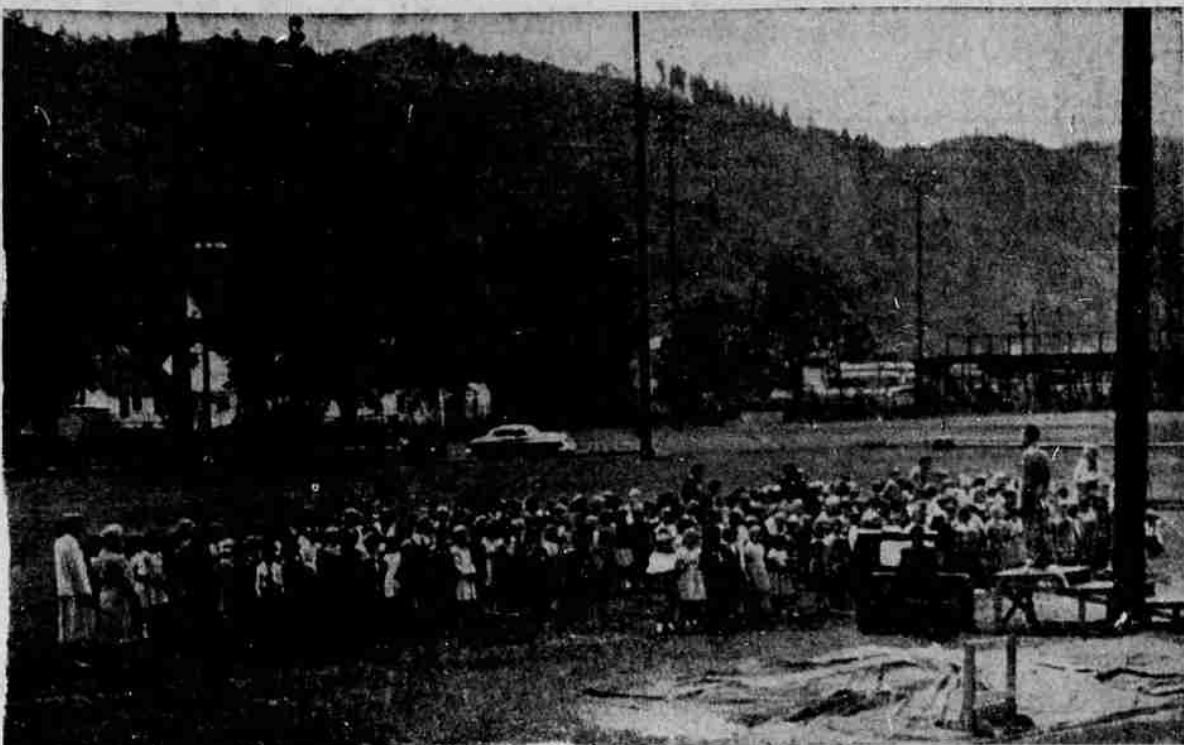


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MUSIC FESTIVAL—Children of the first three grades in the Roseburg schools participated in the second of two music festivals for elementary children Wednesday afternoon on

Anti-American Rant Has Little Japan Support

TOKYO — Japan's publications are firing some sharp criticism at the U.S. occupation, which for more than six years kept them on a close rein.

In most instances, however, the attacks appear to be cases of letting off steam rather than an indication of anti-American trend in the Japanese press.

In fact, all Japanese newspapers except the Communists denounced the anti-American riots loosed by the Reds on May Day.

Editorials declared that the rioters, who shouted "Yankee, go home," did not reflect the sentiment of the mass of Japan's population.

A favorite theme was illegitimate children fathered by occupation soldiers. Some newspapers asserted there were as many as 200,000 "occupation babies."

Tanza Ishibashi, a former finance minister who was purged by the Allied occupation, leveled the wholly unsupported charge that some occupation officials took

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bribes from Japanese for favors. His article appeared in Keizai Orui (Economic Perspective), a monthly magazine of small circulation.

Purged Minister Bitter
Ishibashi asserted his purge in 1947 was a "frame-up." At the time he was financial minister in the cabinet of Prime Minister Shigeru Yoshida.

Obviously bitter, he charged the occupation favored "English-speaking stooges or Communists."

The Asahi Weekly, considered Japan's most influential news magazine, carried comments of 28 prominent Japanese, all of whom had some bitter words for the occupation.

They recounted what they said were personal humiliation and strong-arming from drunk or misbehaving U. S. soldiers.

One complained of "alien reforms forced down Japanese

throats."

Another declared "prostitution thrived because of American patronage."

Anti-Americanism, which the Communists try to arouse, could of course grow in intensity if newly sovereign Japan runs into serious economic difficulties.

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
