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'52 Shakespeare Festival Is Due

ASHLAND — Ashland's 1952 Shakespearean Festival will begin rehearsals June 16, Angus Bowmer, producing director, announces. The season opens on August 1 with presentation of "The Tempest." It will conclude on August 30.

Four outstanding members of the 1951 Oregon Shakespearean festival company have been awarded scholarships for the 1952 season, Angus said. Six other young actors, all of them experienced Shakespeareans and most of them having professional experience, have also been named to receive the festival association's board and room grants for the season.

The Black Museum is Scotland Yard's storehouse of clues and weapons which played an important part in the capture of law-breakers. How the Yard operatives were able to use these clues is related by narrator Orson Welles as he unfolds a different tale of crime and punishment each Tuesday evening. "The Four Black Bottles" holds a suspenseful story of a cruel murder and the killer who, like all criminals, thought he was too smart to be apprehended. . . until he made one mistake.

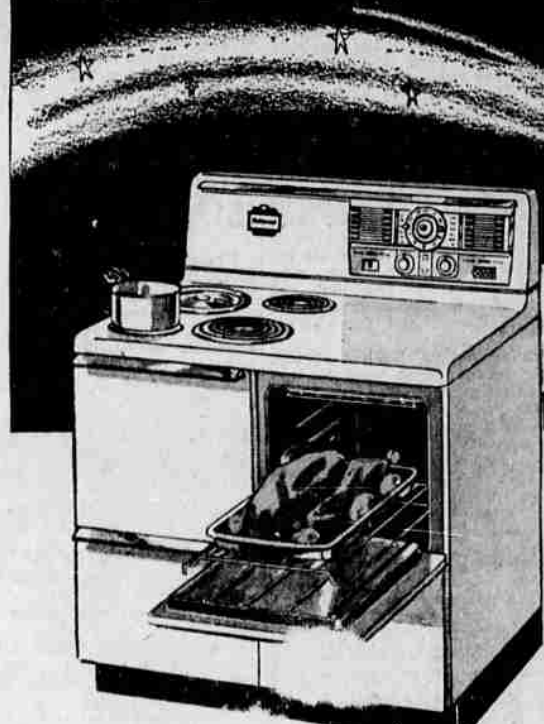
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
