

Pro-Ike Strategy Wins In Primary

The name Eisenhower apparently was the magic key to the treasure chest of votes in Douglas County at Friday's primary election.

Returns unofficially tabulated by The News-Review indicate that the strategy of Eisenhower campaign leaders in announcing a slate of 10 candidates achieved its purpose. But candidates for delegate to the national nominating convention who used Eisenhower's name in their ballot slogans ranked up with members of the Eisenhower slate. The strategy employed by the general's supporters, despite the criticism it aroused, achieved its purpose of concentrating the vote.

Idenced disapproval of the six unpledged candidates, presumably supporting Taft, who were left far behind in the contest.

Eisenhower's strength in Douglas County, based on the proportion of votes for delegates, would indicate three or more to one over Taft, taking into consideration the manner in which the vote was divided over the 50 candidates for delegate-at-large.

Even more indicative of the Douglas County sentiment was the vote for delegates from the Fourth Congressional district in which Peterson and Walsh of Cook County, both expressing preference on the ballot for Eisenhower, ran neck-and-neck with Eugene Springer, a Douglas County resident.

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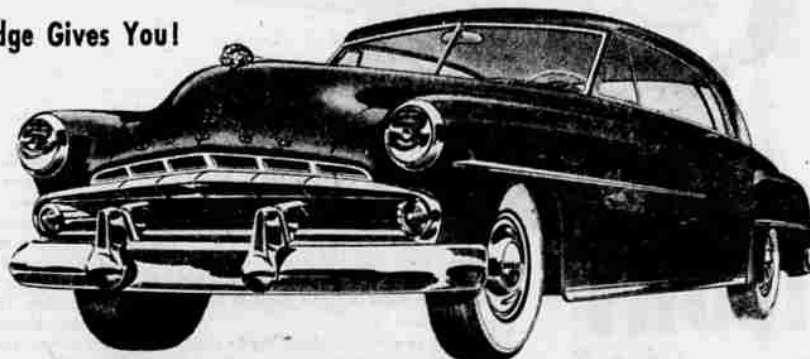
