Umpqua Highway Contract Goes To Portland Firm

Orville C. Hanson, resident engineer for the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads, reports that the Watts Construction Company of Portland was awarded the contract for four and one-half miles construction of the new North Umpqua highway from Bogus Creek to Steamboat. It will cost \$465,000. The Watts Co. is planning the building of a camp at Williams Creek to house 50 of their construction men.
Hanson also reports that the Kuckenburg Construction Company has a great number of men and heavy equipment on the job to complete the two contracts which it holds for construction of the new North Umpqua highway. The contract covering Susa n Creek to Burnt Creek, work on which was started in the spring of 1951, is almost completed. On Kuckenburg's contract for the road construction from Burnt Creek to Bogus Creek, awarded them last fall, the company was able to work only two weeks when weather conditions forced it to close down the first of November, Hanson, in charge of all these operations, states that Kuckenburg Construction expects to have its contracts completed this fall.
