Chambers died in a Portland hospital last May 14. The will is dated May 12. There was no estimate on the value of the estate. Three other estates were admitted to probate Wednesday. Grace Bates, Riddle, was appointed administratrix of the estate of her son, Robert Owen Bates, fatally injured on an automobile crash near Tri-City last Nov. 21.

Forrest Losee, Idleyfield, has been appointed to administer the estate of Dewey Everett Nickerson, who died last Feb. 29.

The will of Lee B. Connelly, admitted to probate Wednesday, leaves his estate to Mildred Gish, Blackfoot, Ida., a daughter. Jaunita Cobb, 803 W. Lane St., was appointed executrix.

**Teacher-Vets Seeking Degree Told Of Rules**

Bill will need a supporting statement from a responsible official of their school, stating they have been regularly employed at teaching during the 1951-52 school year, it was announced by the Veterans Administration.

The statement, which should show the beginning and ending dates of employment, must be presented to the school at the time the teacher starts his course, the VA said. The school will forward it to the VA along with the rest of his enrollment papers.
