### Count Indicates Record Traffic

If you don't like to drive when traffic is heavy, better store your car this summer, says the Oregon State Traffic Safety Division.

April traffic volume, it is reported, increased 11.7 per cent over April of last year, which indicates Oregon may set an all-time travel high this year.

Volume studies, conducted by the State Highway Department at 16 recording stations on various highways, also showed a four per cent volume increase during the first four months of 1952, as compared with the first four months of last year.

High volume points in the April week were near Woodburn, Gresham, Valley Junction, Troutdale and Grants Pass. These figures, the office said, mean heavy traffic can be expected this summer on almost every state highway, which in turn will call for "heads-up" driving if traffic deaths are not to keep pace with car travel.

The safety division had only two suggestions for coping with the expected traffic:

1. Travel at a reasonable speed at all times, meaning the division said, that you should not drive so slow as to block traffic, but don't "fly low" either.
2. Maintain constant alertness for the blunders of other drivers that might involve you in an accident.

### U.S. Air Force Landing At N. Pole Stirrs Soviet

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet aviator who 15 years ago landed Russian scientists near the North Pole said Wednesday the expedition was for scientific purposes but that recent U.S. Air Force activity in the polar region seeks to make it a base for attack on the Soviet Union.

Writing in Red Star, the Army newspaper, Mikhail Vodopyanov said the Americans are carrying out plans for use of the Arctic for military purposes "alien to the Soviet people."

The U.S. Air Force announced on May 4 that one of its C-47 transports had made history's first successful landing at the geographic North Pole.

The Air Force said officials and scientists had spent three hours and 10 minutes on the ice pack taking measurements before returning to their weather station base established earlier on an ice island 135 miles away.

## Loans To Pay Tax Pour In On Indiana Editor

PEKIN, Ind. (AP) — A southern Indiana weekly newspaper publisher said Wednesday the response to his appeal to subscribers for loans to help him meet a demand from the federal tax collector "has been quite good."

The publisher, Victor Green, made the appeal in last week's issue of the five weeklies he publishes in Washington county.

"There has been a continuous stream of people coming into the office since last Saturday," said Green. "They have been making loans of from \$1 to \$50. Also letters have come from as far as 100 miles away."

Green's publications last week carried an "S. O. S." banner in big type over the appeal for loans. Green explained today that the U. S. Collector of Internal Revenue at Indianapolis had demanded payment of about \$9,000 in back taxes.
