

Riverside Wins All-City Track Meet

Both Divisions Shatter Records

Riverside shattered Rose School's extended reign over Roseburg elementary school athletics Wednesday afternoon on Finlay field by sweeping track team championships in both the boys' and girls' divisions.

The Riverside boys captured the fifth annual All-City Grade School meet by scoring 155½ points in the big upset of the day. The Riverside girls topped the list of four schools with a total 133½ points.

Following in the boys division were: Benson 143½, Rose 123, Fullerton 104. Completing the list of girls' squads were Rose 105, Benson 104, Fullerton 93½.

Records fell like tenpins in the meet. In the boys' division, 16 records were broken and two tied. The girls shattered four records.

Three boys set two records each. David Montgomery of Rose posted the 35-yard dash and broad jump marks in the Midget Division; Clarence Seleshanko of Benson broke the 50-yard dash and broad jump marks in the Pee Wee Division, and Clifford Swales of Rose captured new records in the 75-yard dash and shotput events in the Heavy Division.

Little Lois Eddy, in the Midget girls division, didn't break any records for Rose school, but she was the only triple winner of the meet. She took both dashes and won the broad jump with a leap of 11-feet 8-inches. Dianne Myers of Fullerton did the best job of the

day in the record-breaking department. She broke her own record in the Heavy Division broad jump throw by 30 feet. She threw the ball 157 feet.

5 Records Fall As Dodgers Rout Cincinnati Reds, 19-1

Call the cops! Murder, Inc. is back in business at Brooklyn.

With 15 — count 'em 15 — record-breaking runs in the first inning, Boss Chuck (The Brain) Dressen's Dodgers did everything but bundle the Cincinnati Reds in a cement vest.

Five records got the rubber hose treatment while the Dodgers flexed their muscles for the home folks in a 19-1 rout of Cincy.

Records included:

1. New Modern Major League record of most runs scored in an inning, 15. (All time high is 16 scored by Chicago Cubs, Sept. 6, 1883.)

2. New Modern Major League record for most times facing opposing pitcher in one inning, 21. (All time high is 23, by those same Cubs in '83.)

3. New Major League record for runs scored in inning after two were out, 12.

4. New Major League record for most runs batted in one inning, 15.

5. New Major League record for most men reaching base safely in succession, 19.

Brooklyn took over undisputed possession of the National League lead because the New York Giants split a day-night doubleheader with

St. Louis. Cliff Chambers shut out the 1951 champs with four hits to hand Larry Jansen his first loss in the 3-0 day game. But Dave Kool, that old Cardinal jinx, came back to rack up St. Louis for the 10th straight time since June 11, 1950 in the 8-1 night game.

Robin Roberts of the Phillies won his seventh straight by turning back Pittsburgh, 7-3, the Pirates' 27th loss in 32 starts.

Detroit's Virgil Trucks ran his hitless string to 15 2-3 innings in a bid for a second straight no-hitter before Billy Hitchcock of the Philadelphia A's broke the spell with one out in the seventh inning.

Trucks lost his control after the hit and had to be removed in the eighth. Dick Littlefield finished up his two-hitter for a 5-1 victory.

Cleveland lengthened its lead to three full games in the American as Early Wynn and reliever Mike Garcia proved too much for the Boston Red Sox in a 5-1 night win. The St. Louis Browns helped the tribe by knocking off second place Washington, 2-1.

Allie Reynolds turned back Chicago with five hits and delivered a triple and single to the New York Yankees 5-1 win, their eighth win the last 10 games. The scheduled Chicago-at-Boston game in the National was rained out.

OSC, Oregon In Playoffs For College 'Series' Berth

BERKELEY, Calif. — Oregon State, Oregon, Washington and Seattle University are Northwest candidates for berths in the collegiate baseball "World Series" at Omaha this summer.

Playoff brackets to determine the Western representative were announced Wednesday by Pacific Coast Conference officials.

The winner of the Northern Division championship — it could be Oregon State (the present leader), Oregon or possibly Washington — will play the University of California, the PCC Southern Division champion, in a best two-of-three series May 30-31.

The winner of the California Collegiate Athletic Association, either San Diego State or Santa Barbara, will play independent Fresno State at Fresno May 26.

The winner of that game will meet Seattle University May 30-31 or June 2-3.

And that winner will play the

Pacific Coast Conference champion for the right to represent the NCAA's eighth district at Omaha.

The Northern Division champion will be determined this weekend when Oregon State and Oregon meet in their final home — and home series, and Washington takes on Washington State and Idaho.

A split between Oregon State and Oregon would give Washington a shot at the championship. But the Huskies must win the last four games, and they'll be playing them on foreign soil.
