road system is under construction or planned.

3. Cut other areas as soon as feasible.

The aerial survey map shows four classes of attack, it was explained: light epidemic (1 to 3 trees killed in an acre), moderate destruction (4 to 10); heavy (11 to 30), and very heavy (over 30).

In Douglas County—where over half of Oregon's infestation occurs—25.8 per cent of the affected timberlands are "lightly" infested, 42.1 per cent "moderately" infested, 28.5 per cent "heavily" infested and 3.6 per cent "very heavily" infested. The committee stressed that the survey estimates were very conservative, due to the difficulty of spotting diseased trees in their early stages. In the later stages of infestation trees appear yellow, orange, or nearly red, it was pointed out.

The ravage of the beetle became prominent after severe wind-throw of the winter of '49-'50, forest fires of 1951 and a near-hurricane. These conditions were ideal for windstorm of December, 1951, propagation of the beetle.

Since the beetle tends to propagate in its immediate vicinity, the cutting of marginal trees was recommended.

Camas Valley Worst Sufferer

James Watts, Roseburg district U. S. Forester, said that the Camas Valley area suffered the heaviest windfall loss area. Reports of 75 areas of destruction were reported. He said that some salvage timber had recently been sold in the Hubbard Creek, Mt. Scott and Elkhead burn areas.

Robert Walker said that 260,000 acres in the Umpqua area—concentrated in canyons—have been affected. The pace of small salvage timber sales is stepping up, he said. Eighty-six sales were made last year, he announced. Only nine per cent of the needed access roads are now available, Walker commented.

Douglas areas most seriously infested, as shown on the survey map, are the Umpqua, Camas Valley and Tiller areas.

Another survey is being planned to bring the picture up to date, Greeley said. He is counting on the assistance of timbermen to make ground surveys on their property.

Furnish showed colored slides of the infested areas and presented exhibits.

U.S. Military Help To Iran Irks Russia

after an exchange of notes between the U. S. and Iranian governments which the State Department said met the requirements set by Congress.

The Soviet note was prominently displayed in all Moscow newspapers today.

It said that by accepting the U. S. help, "the Iranian army loses its character as a national army of an independent sovereign state" and is being put "under the control of the United States government."

"Such kind of action of the Iranian government cannot be viewed as other than an action incompatible with the clauses of good neighborly relations, the support and strengthening of which are the obligation of the parties which signed the Soviet-Iranian treaty of Feb. 26, 1921."

In Washington a U. S. official said the Russian protest evidently was designed to intimidate the Iranian government.

He said the Tehran government had been under heavy Soviet pressure before and is not expected to give in this time.

Russian troops entered Northern Iran under the 1921 treaty in 1941, at the same time British troops occupied Southern Iran to counter a Nazi threat.

Re's Once Withdrew

The Russians finally withdrew in 1946 after a strong pressure campaign in the United Nations.

Officials in Washington said which Russia is objecting consists American military training mis- of military equipment and three ions.

The U. S. in 1948 also gave Iran a 26 million dollar loan for the purchase of surplus American arms.

49 reported fires was the 17,000-acre fire at Hubbard Creek which started last Aug. 17 and destroyed 19 homes in the Elgarose area before it finally was controlled.

"The cost of putting out a fire is really something," he said, "and many operators cannot bear the costs—not even the big operators."

Of the 49 fires in 1951, 48 were man-caused and 11 of them stemmed from logging or sawmill operations.

"Within the next two weeks, if we don't get any rain, we'll have the fire season on us," Southwick said.

In the state so far this year, according to Walker, fires have burned 129 acres, compared to some 15,000 acres burned over by this time last year.

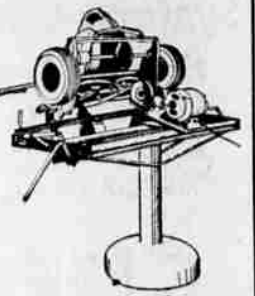
