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U.S. To Lay Keel Of Its First Atom-Driven Sub

WASHINGTON — The keel of this nation's first atom-powered submarine will be laid next month. The Navy said the work on the history-making vessel will be done at the Electric Boat Co., division of the General Dynamics Corp. plant at Groton, Conn.

The actual starting date will be made known soon, the announcement said.

The atomic sub is to be named "Nautilus" after the functional craft described by Jules Verne in 1869 in the novel, "Twenty Thousand Leagues Under the Sea."
