

Mexican Hotel Strike Erases Rotary Bookings

ACAPULCO, Mex. (U) — The Casablanca, one of Acapulco's largest and most expensive resort hotels, was closed Thursday by striking employees demanding that operator A. C. Blumenthal immediately pay them \$22,000 they claim in back wages.

A spokesman for the hotel workers said the management owed its employees \$17,000 and musicians were due another \$5,000. He charged that the hotel also owed back taxes to the city government. The union, he added, had turned down a management offer to pay half the back wages at once.

Hotel service was suspended at noon Wednesday, guests were asked to check out and traditional red

and black strike banners were hoisted at all entrances.

Reservations were cancelled, including heavy bookings for the International Rotary Convention in Mexico City.

Swat At Press In Steel Report Draws Answer

WASHINGTON (U) — The president of the American Society of Newspaper Editors (ASNE) has challenged a statement by Sen. Morse (R-Ore.), that press, radio and television did not fully report the steel seizure dispute.

"News coverage by the American press of all viewpoints on the steel controversy has been thorough and complete," ASNE head Wright Bryan, editor of the Atlanta Journal, said in Atlanta Tuesday night.

"Anyone who says otherwise simply has not read the newspapers, or else refuses to believe the evidence before his eyes."

Bryan said editorial comment has expressed every conceivable attitude as "it always does on controversial issues."

Morse, a supporter of President Truman's seizure of the steel mills, accused the press, radio and television of failing to meet their public trust.

He said they ignored the seriousness of the situation confronting the country and concentrated on the "political overtones" in the dispute.

Declaring that much of the newspaper comment "seemed to follow remarkably" the content of paid advertisements by the steel companies, Morse told a Senate Labor subcommittee news coverage of the steel dispute was "one of the saddest failures of American journalism."

Commissioner Bennett Ousted In Portland Vote

PORTLAND (U) — Portlanders apparently voted to recall City Commissioner J. E. Bennett, forced Mayor Dorothy McCullough Lee into a full runoff, and defeated all money-raising measures.

Bennett, whose city council career has been a stormy one, also was badly beaten for mayor.

Mayor Lee was engaged in a nip-and-tuck race with City Commissioner Fred L. Peterson, and they will fight it out in November. Peterson was ahead of Mrs. Lee 14,296 to 12,794. Lew Wallace was third with 7,540, and Bennett with 2,085. Three other candidates got only a handful of votes.

City Commissioner William A. Bowes apparently won reelection with a clear majority over two opponents. Stanley Earl, former CIO official, was leading in the contest for the council seat being vacated by Commissioner Peterson, but Earl might have a runoff in November against George A. Carlson, a political newcomer.

The defeated money measures included one which would have levied a tax to support the Portland senior and junior symphonies, and another to give the mayor a salary increase.

In the county's legislative races, the nine representatives and three senators who sought reelection all were well ahead for party nomination. State Rep. Rudie Wilhelm, Republican who is slated to be

New Korean War Documentary Film Will Be Shown Monday

"The Flame," believed to be the only motion picture available showing the Communist Prisoner of War Camp on Koje Island, Korea, is to be presented at Junior High School, Monday, May 26, at 8 p.m., DST. It is being sponsored here by a group of Roseburg ministers.

Published just six weeks ago by Great Commission Films, the religiously-inspired 50-minute colored film portrays the problems of an American family separated by war and conscious of the physical and spiritual needs of themselves and those like themselves — the suffering souls of Korea.

Koje Island Prison Camp has figured prominently in the news recently with the capture of Brig. Gen. Francis T. Dodd, former commander of the camp, by the Communists, and a series of prison riots and killings.

Filmed by Robert Pierce, a Youth For Christ vice-president, Christian magazine writer and missionary "ambassador" to the Orient, the picture is attracting unusually large audiences, according to Rev. Ralph R. Carmichael, musical composer and musical director of the movie, who is in Roseburg to appear at the Monday showing.

The Rev. Mr. Carmichael, an ordained evangelist, received an Academy Award in the cultural field in January, 1951, for a 74-week "Campus Christian Hour" television broadcast over a Hollywood station.

Filmed amid fleeing refugees, ruined cities and frontline fighting, the documentary movie weaves through its sequel a missionary challenge to folks back home.

It is the story of Lt. and Mrs. Thomas Ryder (Robert Clarke and Georgia Lee). Ryder is an infantry lieutenant whose correspondent Pierce meets overseas and whose home he later visits. While there, Pierce describes the suffering and sorrow of a nation completely ravaged by the horror of war. Flashback scenes, filmed on the spot, attest to the reality of the tragedy Pierce describes.

Premiered in Los Angeles, "The Flame" is having unusually large audiences, Carmichael reports. At Denver, 9000 persons attended a showing, he said. Klamath Falls packed an estimated 1000 in the Armory, believed to be a record for such an event. In Portland some had to be turned away at the 4500-seat Civic Auditorium.

Pierce also filmed "China Challenge," and "38th Parallel," which have been shown in Roseburg.

Rev. E. Clark Robb is chairman of a committee promoting Monday's presentation.
