Three to 10 numbers are played by the student and he may be a beginner or ready for the concert stage. These auditions are conducted privately to put the pupil as much at ease as possible.

Similar judging is given the recordings which the pupil may choose to send in to the Recording Festival if he wishes to compete for the prizes ranging from \$25 to \$1500 cash for further study.

Professional aid is given to the talented, but the Guild makes a great contribution to American musical life by giving self-realization to the average pupil. He will have a better standard when he is grown and is better able to select

a musician for his church, school or club. All selections played for the adjudicator are from memory. The adjudicator gives the pupils constructive opinions and advice as well as certificates of rating.
