Supplementary articles of incorporation for capital stock increase was filed Wednesday with the county clerk by the Southern Oregon Hardware Co.

The directors, George E. West, Ann R. West and Bernice Beach, said the capital stock is being increased from \$40,000 to \$100,000 with 1,000 shares of common stock at \$10 each.

The increased capitalization was voted at a recent stockholders meeting.

Evergreen Grange No. 46 was also incorporated as a non-profit farmer's organization. Incorporators are Charles A. McCord, Dillard, Besse V. Lounsbury, John D. Hess, Fred Albertus, all Roseburg; and Emery E. Baker, Brockway. The Grange was valued at \$20,000, listing its principal income sources as dues and contributions.

Ketell Home Building Plan Gets Astoria OK

ASTORIA — The city council Tuesday approved an offer by Ketell Construction company, Portland, to purchase 30 lots in west Astoria for construction of 30 homes, and voted to offer the property at public auction June 2.

Ketell offered to pay \$85 a lot, and the property will be put up for sale at this minimum price.

H. R. Ketell, head of the company, told the council he has financing arranged for the 30 homes and FHA loan insurance has been granted him under recent certification of Astoria as a critical defense housing area.

Ketell agreed to complete the houses within 18 months.

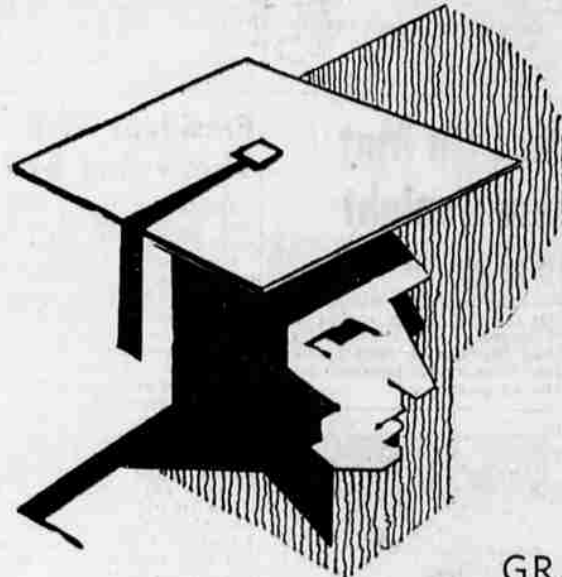
